UP WITH PEOPLE, an international troupe of young performers, will present a concert at 8 p.m. tonight in Pershing Arena. Tickets for the performance at \$1.50 for students, children and senior citizens and \$2 general admission will be available at the door.

THE UNIVERSITY SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA, with William FitzSimmons, director, will present a Bicentennial Orchestra concert tomorrow at 8 p.m. in Baldwin Hall. The concert is free and open to the public.

The concert will begin with the "New World Symphony" by Dvorak. After intermission, a contemporary work by Donald Erb will be conducted by the composer who will spend three days on campus lecturing to classes in the Fine Arts Division. The concert will close with the popular American work "Rhapsody in Blue" by George Gershwin featuring Anna Norberg of the piano faculty as soloist.

THE BRASS QUINTET will present a concert at 8 p.m., Wednesday in Baldwin Auditorium. It is free and open to the public.

The program will include "Fanfare" by David Amram, "Quintet" by Malcolm Arnold and "Quintet #1 for Brass Instruments" by Thom Ritter George.

Quintet members are Jeffrey Piper and Dwight Rhodes, trumpet; Steve Squires, horn; Roger Cody, trombone and Tom Palmatier, tuba.
