NMSU nurses achieve 100% pass rate

The Division of Nursing has been notified by the Missouri State Board of Nursing that the University's May 1990 graduates who took the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX) for Registered Nurses in July achieved a 100 percent passage rate. Besides having 100 percent passage rates, the Northeast graduates also had 100 percent placement rates.

Twenty-seven candidates wrote and passed the exam last summer; 20 graduates tested in Missouri, two in California, two in Illinois, one in North Carolina, one in Iowa and one in Arkansas. This is the second time in four years

that Northeast nursing graduates have had a 100 percent passing rate of the nursing boards.

The July 1990 NCLEX Summary Profiles reported that the nursing program at Northeast ranked first among the 41 registered nurse (RN) programs that participated in this examination from Missouri, ranked first among the 1,407 RN programs that participated in this examination from all member board jurisdictions, and ranked first among the 460 baccalaureate RN programs that participated in this examination from all member board jurisdictions.

The population of the member board jurisdiction includes all graduates from programs in the United States, Guam, American Samoa, the Virgin Islands and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands who took the NCLEX for the first time. All nursing programs with the same percentage of graduates passing the exam share the same ranking.

Rebecca McClanahan, assistant professor of nursing, stated, "The faculty is extremely pleased and we believe that this is a reflection of the quality of the curriculum and instruction."

Alumnus presents Science Seminar

Don White, manager of analytical services for the American Cyanamid Company will present two seminars on Nov. 8. The first seminar, "Product Registration in the 90's: Industry's Response to Changing EPA Philosophies," will be held for science students at 3:30 p.m. in the SUB Tangerine Room. The main seminar, the "Role of the Scientist in the Chemical Industry—Product Development to Marketing," will be held at 7:30 p.m. in the SUB Activities Room. He will address questions such as "What is the role of scientists manufacturing safe products that will satisfy a multitude of human needs?"

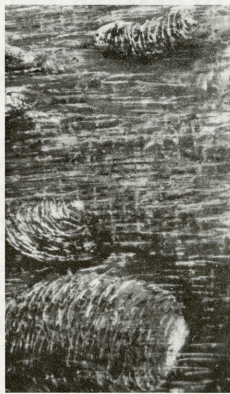
White received his bachelor's degree in biology and chemistry in 1977, and his master's in biology in 1979. He has been employed at the American Cyanamid Company in Hannibal, Mo., for 14 years. For the past six years, he has served as a laboratory manager, before that he was in a supervisory position for four years.

In addition to his management, of the laboratory at the Hannibal plant,

White has also been involved in serving as chairman of the international committee on analytical procedures for drug analysis; writing analytical procedures for state and federal EPA manuals on pesticides; working extensively on domestic and foreign product registration; and managing analytical development efforts during start up of new foreign and domestic plants.

White has also been a liaison between research development of new products and government agencies which set up safety standards for the manufacturing, distribution and use of new products. He will present some key insights into some of the history, as well as the new developments, that permeate the industrial/governmental complex.

The American Cyanamid Company was created in 1907 when it first produced calcium cyanamid, a synthetic fertilizer. The Cyanamid plant at Hannibal produces agriculture chemicals, including Scepter, Prowl, Counter and Thimet and Aurcomysin.
