"THE BEST TEST" will be Dr. Jack Roy's topic tonight at a meeting of Phi Delta Kappa education honorary at 7 in the Conference Room of the SUB. Roy is director of curriculum with the Missouri State Department of Education.

Beginning in January, 1978, the BEST (Basic Education Skills Test) will be given by state law to all 8th graders. It will consist of three parts -- language skills, mathematics, and civics/economics. According to Dr. Joel Kallem, superintendent of the Schuyler R-I Schools, passing the test could become a requirement for graduation from high school.

Everyone's invited to hear Roy's talk.

SATURDAY'S ORIENTEERING MEET has been cancelled because of the cold weather. Ed Bardill of the Military Science Division said a new date will be selected soon.

"THEY HAD EXPERIENCED DEATH, finding it not frightening, they did not dread it at some future time." This was one of the conclusions reached by Dr. Russell Noyes, authority on death and dying, in his speech Monday night in Baldwin Auditorium.

Noyes said the interpretation of death by those close to death was a combination of biological, psychological, and spiritual experiences, but there was no proof for any one interpretation.

"Those expecting to experience agonizing fear, were spared this, instead they experienced a calm peacefulness beyond explanation," he said. The person experienced his "death" as a "detached observer."

When questioned about life after death, Noyes commented that as a Lutheran, "I believe in life after death. As far as scientific data, there is no evidence of life after death nor against it."
