PLACEMENTS INTERVIEW DAY will be held Monday, April 21, in Pershing Arena. At least 147 school districts from Missouri and surrounding states will be represented in the event, sponsored by the Career Planning and Placements Center. Interested students may register this week in the center, first floor, Blanton Hall. One resume or interview form is needed for each school.

GARRY WILLS, nationally syndicated columnist, author and lecturer, will speak on "Inventing America--Jefferson and Lincoln" at 8 p.m. Wednesday in Baldwin Auditorium. The program, sponsored by the University Lyceum Series, is open to the public. Wills' column "Outrider" has been distributed by the University Press Syndicate to several national newspapers since 1970. As a political analyst, he has authored several books including "The Second Civil War" and "Nixon Agonistes." Wills received a B.A. from St. Louis University in 1957, an M.A. from Xavier University in Cincinnati in 1958, and an M.A. in 1959 and Ph.D. in 1961 from Yale University.

"DRAFT REGISTRATION IN A FREE SOCIETY--A Contradiction in Terms" will be a talk presented at 8 p.m. Monday, April 21, in 106 Laughlin Building. Dr. David B. Meltz, an attorney from Atlanta, Ga., will speak. He received his bachelor's degree from Brooklyn College and Ph.D. from the University of Rochester. He has taught political science at Michigan State University and Georgia Institute of Technology. He graduated as valedictorian from Woodrow Wilson Law School in 1977. He is adjunct professor of commercial and constitutional law at Woodrow Wilson. The lecture is part of the University Lyceum Series.

JIMMY CARTER, CHRISTOPHER BOND and registration for the draft were the winners in the April 8 mock election sponsored by the Young Democrats. Carter received 36.1 percent of the vote to defeat Reagan, Anderson and Kennedy in the presidential election. Bond received 49.6 percent of the ballots cast to defeat Teasdale, Spainhower and Phelps for the governor's position. Also, 53.4 percent of the 250 students voting favored registration for the draft. Slightly over 50 percent felt that females should be drafted along with males.
