Joey Martin, sophomore, received third place in the nation in Accounting I contests at the Phi Beta Lambda National Leadership Conference, held July 5-9 in Washington, D.C. Martin also represented the NMSU chapter of Phi Beta Lambda, a professional business club, as a voting delegate at the conference.

Two national student exchange participants are on the NMSU campus for the 1980-81 school year. They are Debbie Griffin from Boise State University, Idaho, and Diana Koczon from Buffalo State College, New York.
