NORTHEAST FACTS

DEGREES AND CERTIFICATES granted at NMSU in 1983 are up seven percent from 1982 but the number of bachelor's and master's degrees in education granted declined more than 73 percent since 1973. Approximately 86 percent fewer education degrees were granted to males and more than 66 percent to females. This year, however, a record number of 633 BS degrees and 87 BA degrees were awarded to NMSU graduates. Business Administration proved the most popular program with 225 degrees granted.

THE COLLEGE BOARD'S new publication "The College Cost Book" reveals that Northeast is well below the average 12 percent tuition increase of public four-year colleges and universities. The book, which lists tuition and fees at more than 2,600 post-secondary institutions, shows the cost of tuition and fees at NMSU increased only 8.3 percent. Average in-state tuition and fees among the listed schools is \$1,105 for the 1983-84 academic year. Current costs at NMSU are \$620 for in-state students.

WILLIE STARGELL, former baseball star with the Pittsburgh Pirates, will present the opening performance of the 1983-84 Lyceum Series at 8 p.m., Sept. 21, in Baldwin Auditorium. Stargell is now a popular lecturer on the college circuit.
