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London Program Offers Study Abroad

The Missouri London Program (MLP), a study abroad program, is accepting applications for the fall 1990 and spring 1991 semesters. Students can earn between 12 and 15 academic credits which may be used to satisfy general education and other degree requirements.

NMSU participants will join other students from member institutions in Missouri: Central Missouri State, Southeast Missouri State, Southwest Missouri State, the University of Missouri-Columbia, the University of Missouri-Kansas City, the University of Missouri-

Rolla, the University of Missouri-St. Louis and Northwest Missouri State.

Courses for 1990-91 will be offered in communication, economics, English, history, marketing and psychology. The courses are taught in London by faculty from member universities.

The MLP enhances cross-cultural experiences by providing tours to acquaint students with London, Oxford and Bath as well as other destinations in Britain and continental Europe. Participating students will have membership in the Students' Union of Imperial College, which allows them to use the cafeteria, lounges, game rooms, sport

hall facilities, swimming pool and tennis courts. Membership in the union will also give Missouri's students opportunities to interact with British and other international students.

The cost of the program is \$2,995 per student for 16 weeks. This does not include the student's regular tuition, registration fees at NMSU or round-trip airfare to London. Total cost is estimated at \$6,500, and financial aid is available to eligible students.
