## Baldwin Lecture Set for April 10



John Krumboltz, professor of education and psychology at Stanford University, will deliver the keynote address at the 33rd Joseph Baldwin Lecture and Recognition Banquet at 6:30 p.m., April 10, in the Student Union Building Georgian Room.

Krumboltz is a fellow of the American Psychological Association and the American Association for the Advancement of Science. During 1967-68, he was a Guggenheim Fellow. In 1970, Krumboltz was a short-term American Grantee to East Asia for the Department of State, and during 1975-76 he served a fellowship at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences.

Krumboltz is a three-time Outstanding Research Award recipient from the American Personnel and Guidance Association. Also to his credit are visiting fellowships as a senior research psychologist for the Educational Testing Service, for the Institute of Psychiatry at the University of London and for the National Institute for Careers Education and Counseling in Cambridge, England.

Krumboltz received a bachelor's degree in psychology from Coe College in 1951 and a master's in guidance from Columbia University in 1951. He was a teacher and counselor at West Waterloo (Iowa) High School from 1951-53 before entering the University of Minnesota where he earned a doctorate in educational psychology in 1955. From 1955-57, Krumboltz was a

research psychologist for the U.S. Air Force. He then spent five years on the faculty of Michigan State University before joining the Stanford faculty in 1961.

As a member of the American Psychological Association, Krumboltz has held offices in the Divisions of Counseling Psychology and Educational Psychology, as well as on the Council of Representatives and the Board of Professional Affairs. He is also a member of the American Association for Counseling and Development, American Educational Research Association, American Association for the Advancement of Science, Society for Scientific Exploration and International Interactive Communication Society.

Krumboltz has served on the editorial boards of *Journal of Counseling Psychology*, *California Journal of Educational Research*, *Journal of College Student Personnel*, *British Journal of Counseling and Guidance* and *Computer in Human Behavior*. He has refereed the *Academic Psychology Bulletin*, *American Psychologist*, *Behavioral Assessment*, *Behavior Therapy and Experimental Psychiatry*, *Journal of Applied Behavior Analysis*, *Journal of Applied Social Psychology*, *Perceptual and Motor Skills*, *Psychological Reports* and *Review of Educational Research*.

A prolific author in his field, Krumboltz is co-author of *Changing Children's Behavior* and co-editor of *Counseling Methods and Assessing Career Development*.

Krumboltz is listed in *Who's Who in America*, *Leaders in Education and American Men and Women of Science*.

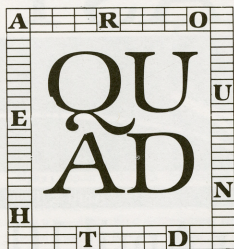

## Technology: Friend or Foe?

Activist and social critic Jeremy Rifkin will share his views on the uses and abuses of technology during a three-part presentation series, April 10. The following day, Warren Strauss, manager of biotechnology government affairs for Monsanto Agricultural Company of St. Louis, will counter Rifkin's perspective.

Rifkin, author of several books including *Entropy*, *Algeny* and *Time Wars*, is perhaps best known for his recent court challenges to the environmental release of genetically engineered organisms. He served on President Carter's Commission on the Agenda for the '80s and has appeared on such TV shows as 20/20, Face the Nation and Firing Line. Strauss' company, Monsanto, conducts corporate research and uses genetic engineering in product development.

## Barnes Receives Italian Residency



Jim Barnes professor of comparative literature, will spend a month in Italy this spring, beginning a translation of two volumes of poetry by West German poet Dagmar Nick.

Barnes was awarded a Bellagio Residency Fellowship from the Rockefeller Foundation of New York City. The resi-

dency runs from May 5 through June 5, at the Rockefeller Bellagio Study and Conference Center in Bellagio, Italy. In 1980, Barnes received a \$500 Translation Award from the Translation Center of Columbia University (New York) for his translation of another volume of Nick's work. Barnes said he has admired Nick's work for years, and corresponds with her.

After the close of the residency, Barnes will attend the 13th Anglo-Franco Festival in Poetry and Translation in Paris, France, June 5 through 9. He is one of only a handful of American poets invited to participate in the festival this year.
