# Northeast Notables

The *Index* has been recognized as "Best in State" for the second consecutive year. The paper also received more than 25 additional awards, including "Best Overall Paper." The awards were presented at the Missouri Collegiate Media Association on April 13 in Kansas City, Mo. Northeast competed against all colleges and universities in Missouri, including the University of Missouri-Columbia. At the national level, the *Index* won several awards in a contest held by the Society of Professional Journalists.

**John T. Ishiyama, associate professor of political science**, had his article "Red Phoenix? The Communist Party in Post-Soviet Russian Politics," published in the April 1996 edition of *Party Politics*. He also had his article "The Sickle or the Rose?: Previous Regime Types and the Evolution of the Ex-Communist Parties in Post-communist Politics," accepted for publication in a forthcoming issue of *Comparative Political Studies*.

Course Program award for their joint course, Environmental Ethics. The award program offers up to 100 colleges, universities and schools of theology worldwide monetary prizes for teaching the best courses in science and religion.

He has also received notice of his election as a councilor (at-large division) in the Council on Undergraduate Research.
