Accreditation Self-Study Subcommittee to Focus on Acquisition, Discovery and Application of Knowledge

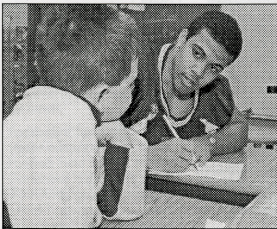
This article is the second of several articles describing the subcommittees, consisting of faculty, staff and students, that are currently engaged in a comprehensive self-study of Truman. The second criterion on which a subcommittee will evaluate the University is Acquisition, Discovery and Application of Knowledge.

This subcommittee is charged with collecting evidence that demonstrates that the University's educational priorities are focused on, and supportive of, the responsible acquisition, discovery and application of knowledge. An analysis of data from both the general education/liberal studies and graduate curricula will be required to substantiate that the University is committed to helping students prepare for a life of learning. The subcommittee will also provide evidence demonstrating that the university examines the curricula through a variety of means to ensure that knowledge,

skills and attitudes learned are broad in scope and useful in the work-world.

The subcommittee is chaired by Janet Gooch, associate professor of communication disorders, and includes Paula Cochran, professor of communication disorders; Terry Gabel, assistant professor of business administration; Dan Hite, associate professor of biology; James Jereb, associate professor of art; Robert Jones, division head of fine arts and professor of art; Michelle Kleine, assistant professor of communication; Julie Lochbaum, director of the Center for Teaching and Learning; Judy Lundberg, director of grants; Wendy Miner, assistant professor of education; Paul Parker, professor of political science; Carol Thatcher, assistant professor of mathematics; Dana Delaware, associate division head of science and professor of chemistry; and a student representative, Amber Byrd, sophomore agriculture science major from St. Louis.

Corrugated cardboard only. Please flatten and stack cardboard. Drop-off sites are available by most dumpsters on campus.

Anything with food scraps*

♻️ HARD BOOKS

Can be placed in book recycle containers or placed with papers.

Acceptable

*All books
Spiral binders
Books with glued ends*

♻️ SHREDDED PAPER

All shredded paper must be in bags and tied securely.

Acceptable

*White paper
Colored paper
Any paper that can be placed in mixed office.*

♻️ PRINTER CARTRIDGES

♻️ NEWSPAPERS

Can be tied with a string, put in paper bags, placed in a cardboard box or placed loose in newsprint containers.

NOTE: Advertising supplements that come in the newspapers can stay with the newspapers when recycled.

♻️ MAGAZINES

Only slick or shiny magazines and catalogs accepted.

Time, Newsweek, National Geographic, Catalogs, Etc.

♻️ CANS

All aluminum cans are acceptable. Please rinse the cans and remove labels if possible.

♻️ GLASS

Glass must be rinsed. Lids are not accepted.

♻️ MIXED OFFICE PAPER

Can be tied with string, placed in cardboard box or paper bags or placed loose in mixed office paper containers.

♻️ PLASTIC BOTTLES AND JUGS

Check the bottom of the container for the recycling logo. Inside the logo is a number identifying the type of plastic. Generally, plastics accepted for recycling at Truman are #1 and #2 only. Containers must be rinsed. Caps and lids may be left on.

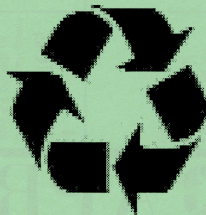
