David Dixon, senior physics major, has been awarded a National Science Foundation Graduate Fellowship. This is the second time in four years that an NMSU physics student has received such an honor. **Neal Simmons**, senior chemistry major, received an honorable mention.

Keith Doubt, assistant professor of sociology, was the discussant for a session on "Language, Interaction, and Institution" and **Barb Halpenny**, junior sociology and philosophy major, presented a paper, "The Role of Language in Creating Community," in a session on "Symbolic Communities" at the Midwest Sociological Society meeting, April 11-14 in Des Moines, Iowa.

Mary Giovannini, associate professor of business administration, presented a paper titled "Measuring the Quality of Support Services Provided for Customers in the Computer Industry" at the Midwest Business Administration Association meeting April 3-5 in Chicago.

David McKamie, associate professor of music, conducted a master class for piano performance majors at Wichita State University. He also judged their annual piano competition for collegiate and high school pianists. Later this semester, McKamie will judge piano auditions in Jefferson City and Chillicothe, Mo.

Paraschos Maniatis, associate professor of industrial science, published a paper, "Quality Control in a Selected Number of Industrialized Countries," in the *International Journal of Materials and Product Technology*.

Jerry Vittetoe, professor of business and adviser of Phi Beta Lambda business fraternity, has been selected as the 1991 Outstanding Phi Beta Lambda adviser in Missouri. The award was presented at the Missouri State Phi Beta

Lambda Leadership Conference in Jefferson City, Mo., April 19-20. Vittetoe will also be recognized at the National Phi Beta Lambda Leadership Conference to be held in Anaheim, Calif., July 6-9.

Traci Crone, junior accounting major, has received a \$500 cash award from the McGladrey and Pullen Certified Public Accountants of Cedar Rapids, Iowa. The annual award, which is given to a student who demonstrates excellence in accounting, is in honor of I.B. McGladrey, founder of the firm.

Marlow Ediger, professor of education, spoke on "Wholism as a Philosophy of Reading Instruction" at the Indiana State Reading Association conference in Indianapolis, April 26. He was reappointed to the Editorial Board of *Reading Improvement*, a professional international journal

published by Project Innovation.

Jerrold Hirsch, assistant professor of history, gave a slide/tape presentation titled "When Ma Rainey Came to Town": The Blues, Sterling Brown, and Cape Girardeau," at the Missouri Conference on History, April 5-6, at Southeast Missouri State University, Cape Girardeau, Mo.

Congratulations to the **Northeast College Bowl team** which placed 13th in the nation in the 1991 College Bowl National Championship Tournament in Chicago. The team had a 4-11 record beating Washington University, Georgia State, the University of Pennsylvania and the University of Oregon. The scores were close in many of the games lost by the team. First in the nation was Rice University, followed by Cornell University and the University of Minnesota.

S.W. Bell President to Deliver Commencement Address

Randy Barron, president of the Missouri Division of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, will deliver the address at Northeast's 121st spring commencement at 10 a.m., May 18, in Stokes Stadium.

During his career with the company, which began in 1948 as a lineman, Barron has held a variety of positions in Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Texas. He was with AT&T in New York in 1963-64.

Barron has been located in St. Louis since the early 1970s and has been vice president both at the company's general headquarters and on Missouri state staff during that period. He was named vice president-Missouri operations in August 1981 and assumed his present position in March 1984.

A native Kansan, Barron is a graduate of Wichita State University and the Ad-

vanced Management Program at the Harvard Graduate School of Business.

Barron is a member of the board of directors of the following organizations: Convention Plaza Redevelopment Corporation, Missouri Chamber of Commerce, Junior Achievement, Commerce Bancshares Inc., St. Louis Arts and Education Council, Hawthorn Foundation, St. Louis Regional Commerce and Growth Association, Missouri Historical Society, U.S. National Senior Olympics and the Municipal Theatre Association. He is a member of the Chancellor's Council-University of Missouri at St. Louis and the Wishing Well Foundation.

Barron's honors include being named the Manchester Methodist Man of the Year in 1981 and a 1985 recipient of the Mathews-Dickey Boys' Club Distinguished Citizen of the Year Award.

Chariton Review Wins Contest

Jim Barnes, professor of comparative literature and editor of the *Chariton Review*, has received the 1990 Hanks Contest award for editor. The Stanley Hawks Memorial Poetry Prize selects the best poem published in a Missouri magazine during the calendar year and awards are given to the writer of

the poem and the editor of the magazine. This year's winning poem, "The Early Jobs" by David Ray, was published in the *Chariton Review*. The *Chariton Review* has previously won the Hanks Award while *Paintbrush*, edited by Ben Bennani, associate professor of English, won last year.

Barnes also has had his poems "Near the Top" and "The Cabin on Nanny Ridge" accepted for publication in *Poetry East*, a Chicago literary magazine headquartered at DePaul University. He has also been invited to be a featured presenter at the Jackson, Wyo., Snake River Institute in the summer of 1992.
