NORTHEAST NOTES

Pat Ellebracht, Business, presented a paper titled "Tele-lecture Brings Industry to the Campus" at the Mountain Plains Management Conference held at Estes Park, Colo., Oct. 12-14.

Judith Griffen, a spring graduate of the two-year medical secretarial program, has passed the Certified Medical Assistant basic examination and the Administrative Specialty examination. The exam is a rigid one covering areas of anatomy and physiology, medical law and ethics, medical terminology, psychology, medical health insurance, office management and administrative and clinical procedures. Griffen is the first graduate of the medical secretarial program to take the examinations and is now the only Certified Medical Assistant in Kirksville.

David Buckley, Language and Literature, conducted a debate workshop and served as guest judge and critic for the Greater St. Louis Forensic League. More than 500 students from 40 schools in the St. Louis area attended. Buckley has also published and co-edited Alternatives: For Energy Policy, a high school debate handbook published by Springboards, Inc.

On Oct. 6, Robert Lininger, Special Programs, presented a mime workshop at the Speech and Theatre Association of Missouri in Jefferson City.

Marlow Ediger, Education, has been notified that his paper, "The Psychology of Learning and the Curriculum," will be published in Secondary Education Today. His manuscript "Creative Writing and the Curriculum" will be published in the Saskatchewan, Canada, English Teacher's Journal.

Judson Martin, Education, has been appointed to the National Council on the Accreditation of Teacher Education accrediting team, which will visit Southwest Oklahoma State University in November.

James S. Bailey, Education, was recently notified that he is licensed to practice psychology in Missouri. This license was awarded through the State Committee of Psychologists.

Robert P. Cornell, Science, has received a three-year grant for \$50,000 from the National Institute of Arthritis, Metabolism and Digestive Diseases of the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. This grant is in addition to one he was awarded for \$11,000 from the Greater St. Louis Diabetes Association and the Diabetic Children's Welfare Association of St. Louis. He will study "Insulin and Hepatic Macrophages" with these grants to determine the effects of insulin on the liver.
