THE COUNCIL FOR INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE of Scholars is conducting the Fulbright Scholar Awards competition and the Fulbright Scholar-in-Residence program. Covering periods of two to 10 months, Fulbright Scholar Awards are available in all academic fields and in a wide range of professions. Awards are available for postdoctoral research and college and university lecturing, consultative or teaching positions with governmental bodies or other professional institutions. Application deadlines for the 1985-86 competition are June 15 for Australasia, India, Latin America and the Caribbean, and Sept. 15 for Africa, Asia (except India), Europe and the Middle East. The Scholar-in-Residence program allows community and junior colleges, four-year colleges and universities the opportunity to invite a scholar from abroad to lecture for an academic year in the humanities or social sciences. Institutions must submit their proposals for the program by Nov. 1.
