## Science Seminar presents Wade Davis

Dr. Wade Davis, the author of the recently released horror film "The Serpent and the Rainbow," (directed by Wes Craven "A Nightmare of Elm Street") will present two seminars on campus April 29 and 30. The Science Seminar Series and the Missouri Academy of Science are jointly sponsoring the seminars.

An informal seminar titled "Is Technology Crushing Biological Diversity?" will be presented at 1:30 p.m. April 29 in the SUB Activities Room. His main seminar "Using Toxic Substances for Psychocontrol (Zombies) in Haitian Culture" will be held at 8 p.m. April 30 in the SUB Activities Room. Both seminars are free and open to the public.

Davis earned his bachelor's, master's and doctorate at Harvard University. He has conducted expedi-

tions Peru, Guatemala, Haiti, Brazil, Canada, Colombia, Ecuador and Bolivia.

"The Serpent and the Rainbow" is based on Davis' findings from his 1982 expedition in Haiti, when he explored vodoun rites involving zombies. According to *American Scientist* (Vol. 75), "What he discovered has changed our views of zombies and of Haitian culture."

Davis is the honorary research associate in ethnobotany at the New York Botanical Garden. Besides *The Serpent and the Rainbow*, he is also the author of the book *Passage of Darkness* and many articles.

He has produced documentary films from Guatemala and the Central Andes of Peru. He is currently working on a third book titled *Sheets of Distant Rain*.

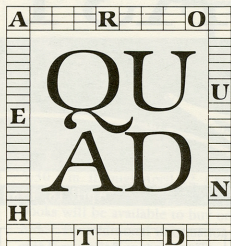

## Hall Director Receives National Award

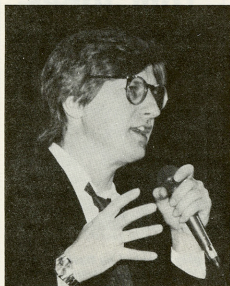

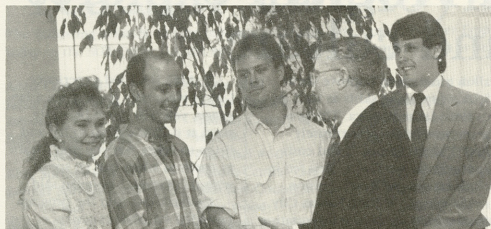

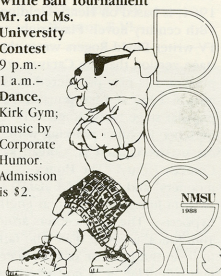

# Costa Rica Program explores language and culture

*This is the last of a series about study abroad opportunities available through NMSU.*

Spanish. It remains one of the most studied foreign languages in the United States. And Spanish-speaking people are the fastest growing minority in the United States. Some 411,000 college students are studying Spanish this year, according to the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages. NMSU students have the opportunity to learn this popular language in an atmosphere where it is spoken daily—Costa Rica.

The eight-week Spanish program located in Costa Rica is designed to

allow students to improve their Spanish speaking skills as well as explore Latin America. The program runs from approximately June 1 through Aug. 2 and costs approximately \$1,942. This fee includes room and board, tuition, round-trip flight from Kansas City, immigration fees and transportation within Costa Rica.

While in Costa Rica students will live with Spanish speaking families and attend classes three hours per day, four days per week. Six hours of credit may be earned.

Senior Joann Heitman participated in the program two summers ago and highly recommends it.

"I think it's good experience. Unless you really go practice a language, you will never be really good at it. You can go to lab and listen to tapes, but you don't learn as much as when you go speak with the natives," Heitman said.

Heitman also said the program provided valuable experiences outside of the classroom.

"We got to go out and see the country, too. It wasn't all just classwork. We met the president, went to Panama and even saw two land turtles lay eggs!" she said.

## Lyceum presents "Tom Jones" on Sunday

The Nebraska Theatre Caravan, who appeared on the NMSU stage in 1985 with "A Christmas Carol," will present the play "Tom Jones" at 8 p.m., April 24, in Baldwin Auditorium. The performance was recently added to the spring Lyceum Series schedule.

"Tom Jones" the play, like the Oscar award-winning movie of 1964, is based on Henry Fielding's 18th century novel. Playwright and TV writer David Rogers wrote the stage version that the Caravan will present. His play premiered in Illinois in 1965 and has remained a popular stage work. Rogers' TV experience includes working with classic shows such as "Colgate's Comedy Hour," "The Honey-mooners" and "The Thin Man."

"Tom Jones" pokes fun at English hypocrisy. The story centers around Tom Jones, a young man who falls in love. But because of his uncertain parentage he is not permitted to marry her and is ousted from the estate. He heads to London and she follows after, setting off a wild chase.

The play contains nearly all of the main episodes of the novel, covering a wide range of time and numerous locations and including many of the film's colorful backgrounds. Unlike the film, Rogers' play has cleaned up the bawdy incidents. However, no humor or en-

tertainment was lost in the transition.

Free tickets are available for students, faculty and staff in the SAB Office, SUB and at the door. Video and audio recording during the performance are prohibited.

McGlaughlin was honored at the ACPA Convention in Miami, March 22.

McLaughlin, a second-year director, credits her staff and residents for contributing to a successful community environment and her recognition from ACPA.

McGlaughlin has always had an interest in working with students. As an undergrad, she was involved in the residence life program at the

McGlaughlin will graduate in May with a master's in human resource management. She hopes to pursue a career in student affairs and is presently looking at possible doctorate programs and teaching opportunities.
