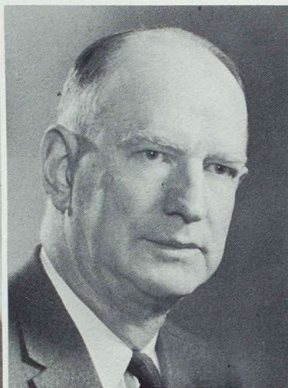


Architect's Drawing of Violette Hall

The ECHO this year will contain the records of our friends and classmates whom we have learned to know, cherish, and love. It will help us to remember

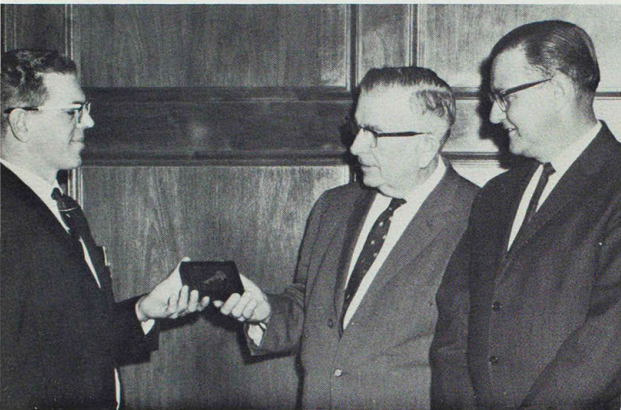

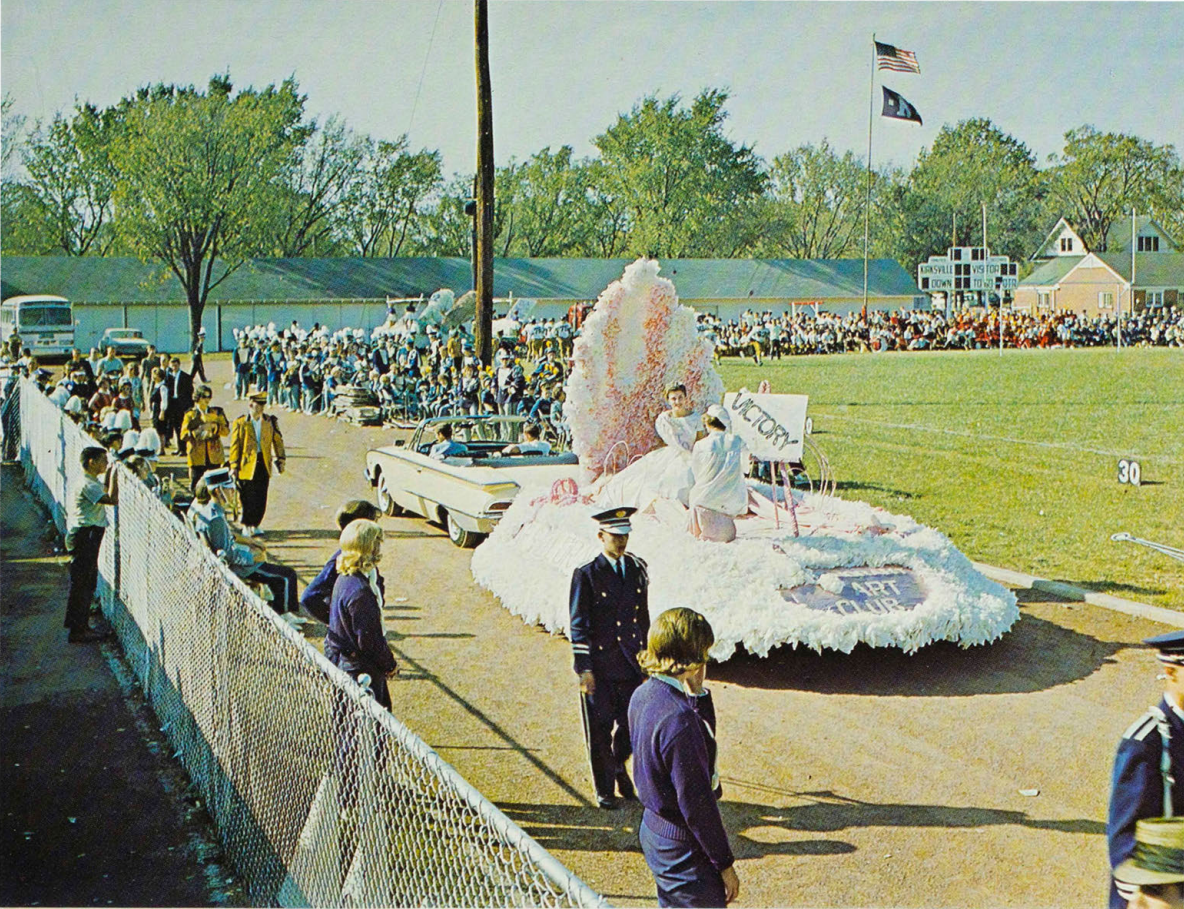

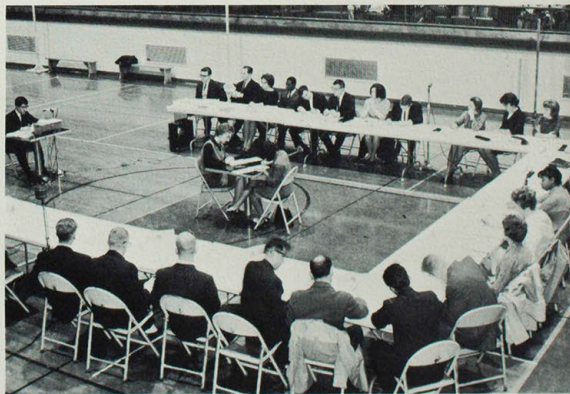

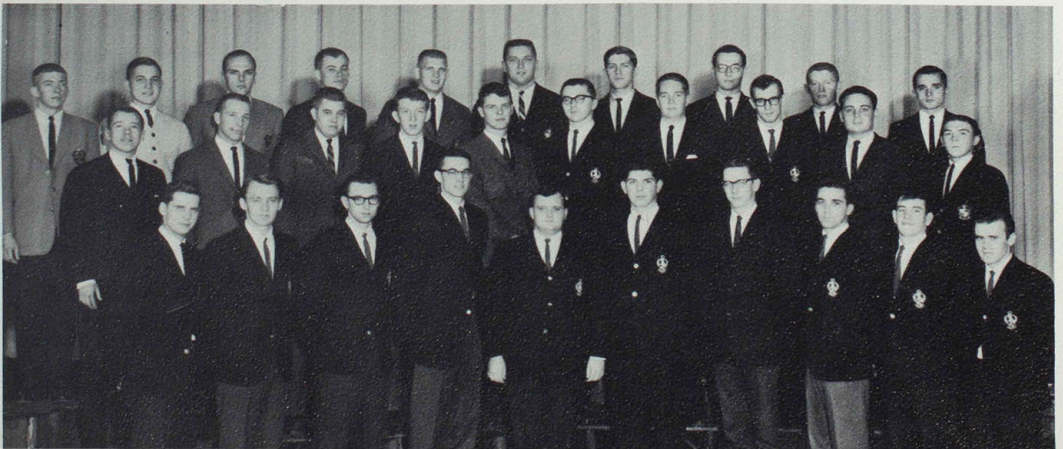
Alpha Phi Sigma is a national honorary organization whose principle aim is to promote high scholarship.

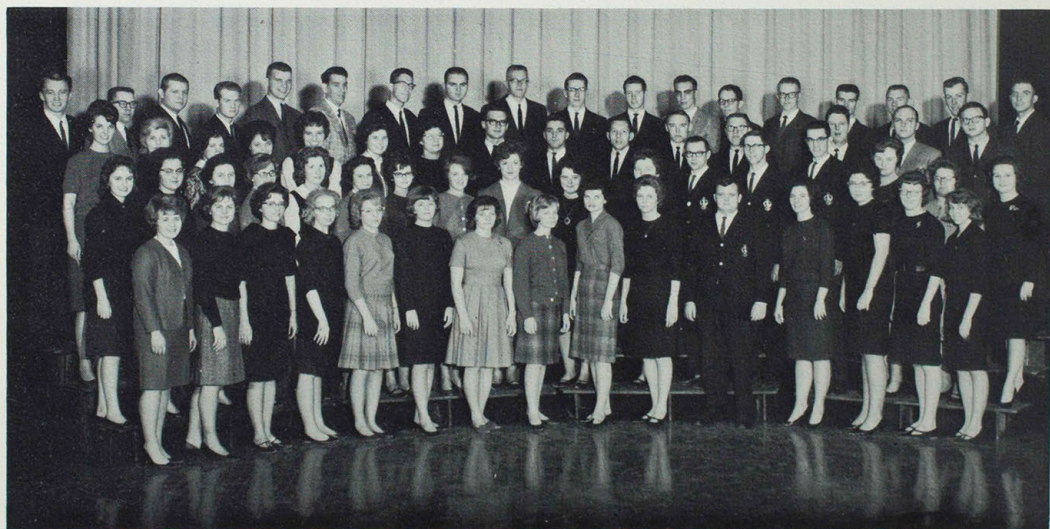

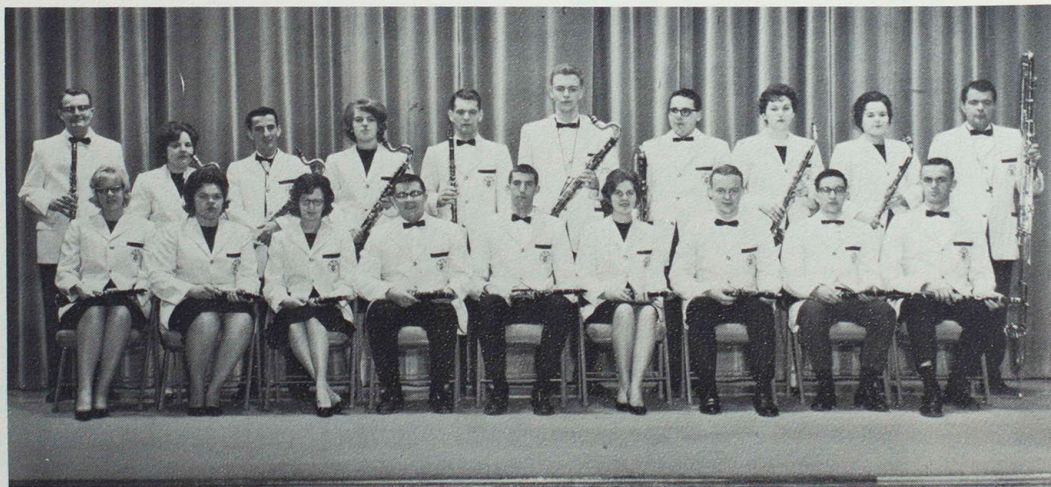


Orchestra

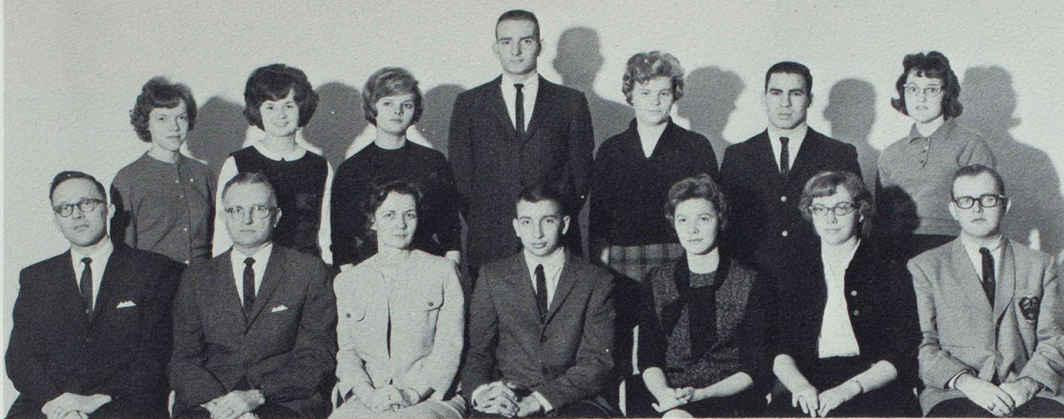
A program is presented at each meeting by a member of the science faculty. The group participates in the annual fair of the Missouri Academy of Science.

The Northeast Missouri State Teachers College Nursing Program is accredited by the Missouri State Board of Nursing. The graduate will have a Bachelor of Science degree, nursing major, and will be permitted to take the state examination for registration, (R.N.). The college has complete jurisdiction of the program of education for professional nursing which includes methods and hours in instruction, clinical assignment, supervision and evaluation of the students by the nursing faculty. The affiliating institutions are Grim-Smith, Laughlin and Kirksville Osteopathic Hospitals in Kirksville and Still-Hildreth Osteopathic Hospital in

Macon, Missouri. These hospitals, with a combined capacity of 350 beds, and associated clinics, provide experience in all institutional nursing services. Public Health Nursing experience is from the district office of the Missouri Division of Health at Macon. The graduate of this program is prepared for staff nursing and is eligible for postgraduate study in any nursing area.

The purposes of the Student Nursing Program are: to prepare professional nurses to serve the expanding needs of humanity in health and disease, and to offer additional preparation in school nursing and techniques of health education.

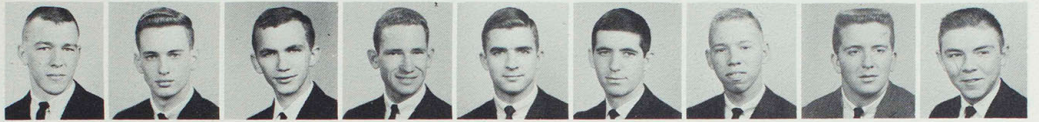

An attempt for the two-point conversion failed and the Ichobods ran out the clock for their upset win. The Washburn game was later forfeited to Kirksville because of their playing ineligible athletes. The score was 1-0.

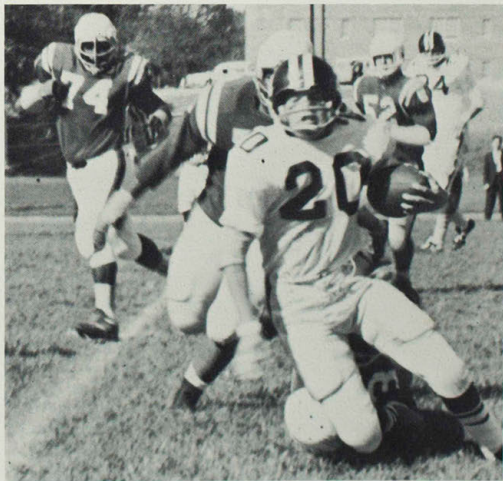


The middle of Northern Illinois' defensive line converges upon Bulldog fullback Morris Rideout near the goal line.

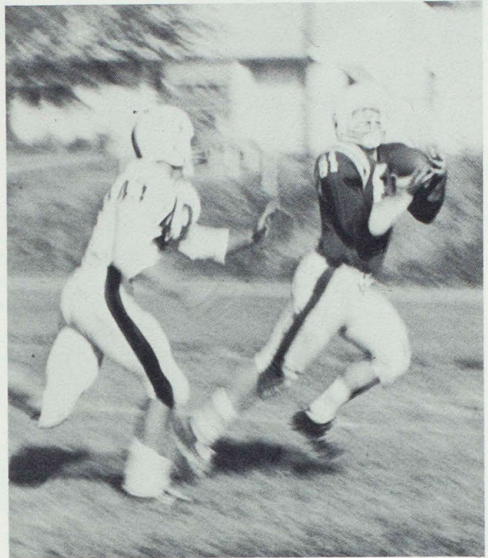

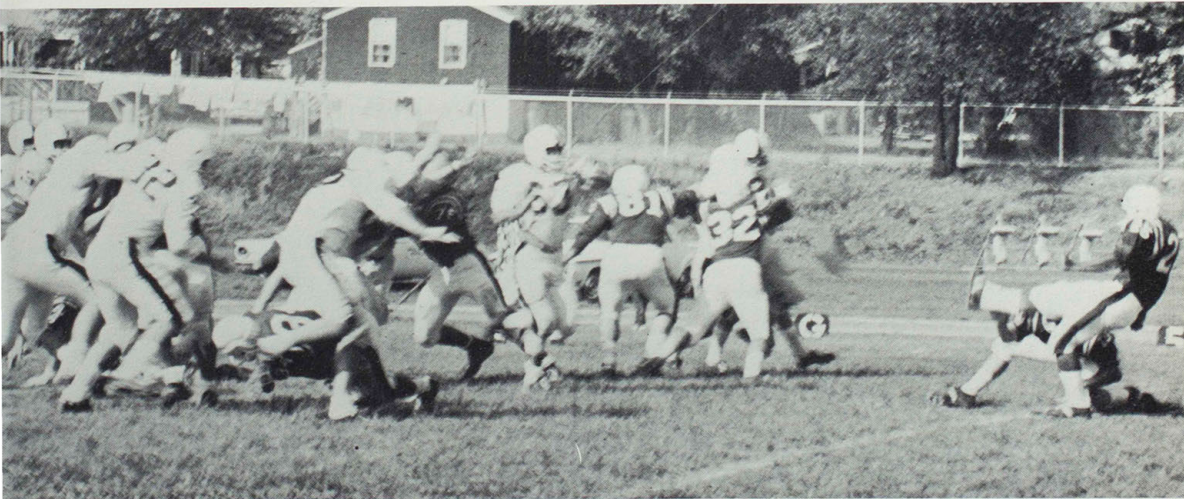

Kirksville Takes 41-0 Homecoming Victory

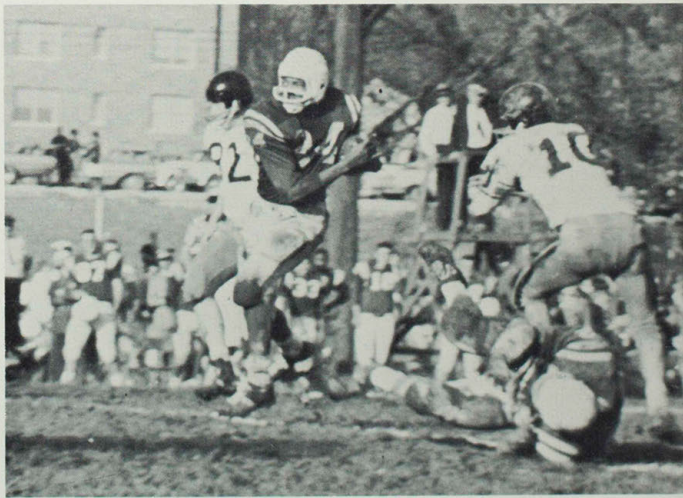

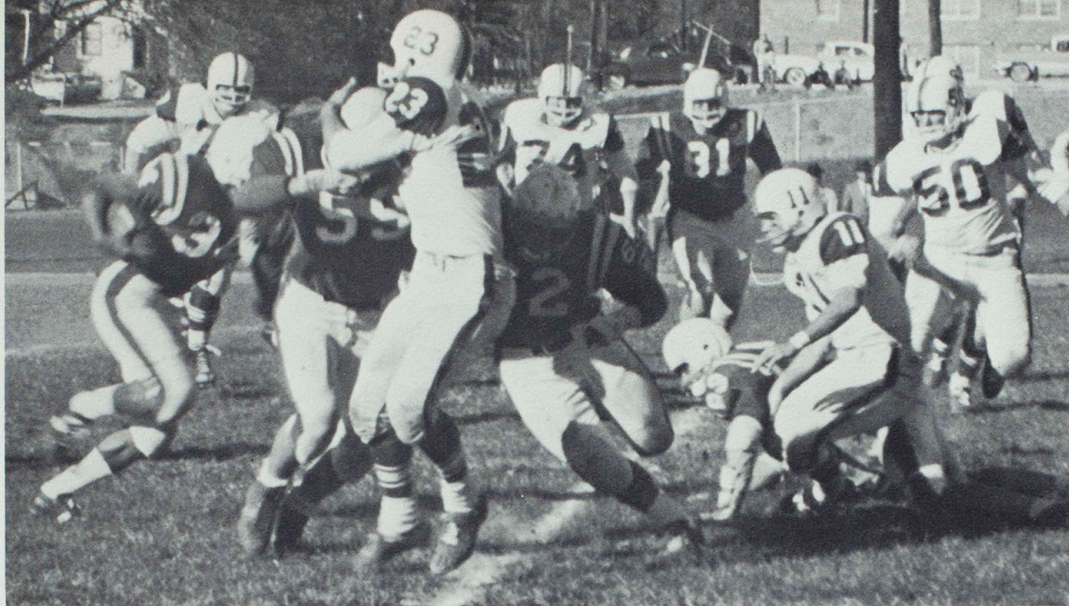
Rolla quarterback Jay Alford is consoled by a tired teammate after the Miners had fallen before the Bulldogs 41-0 on Homecoming Day.

With the pigskin tucked securely under his arm, Mike Richardson races through the middle of the Rolla defense for a big gain.

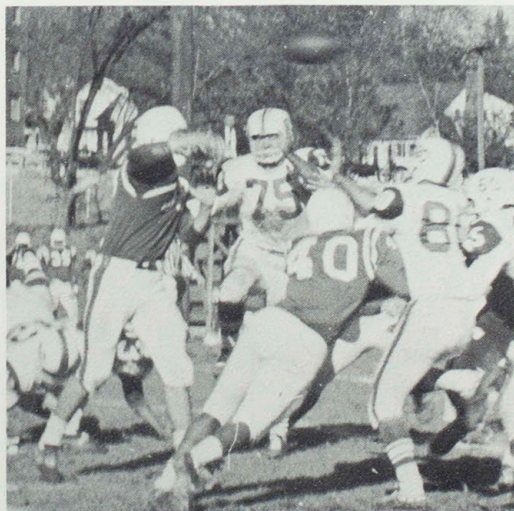

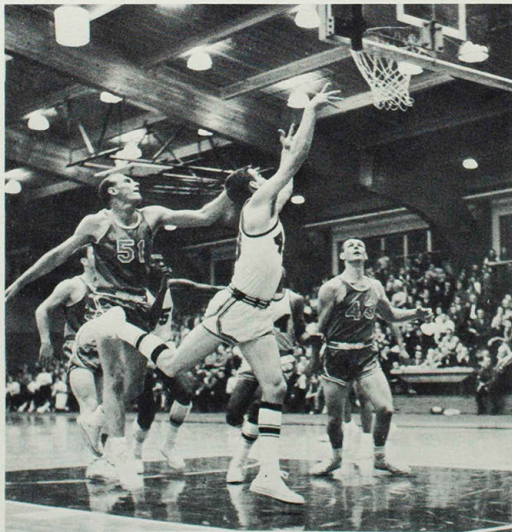

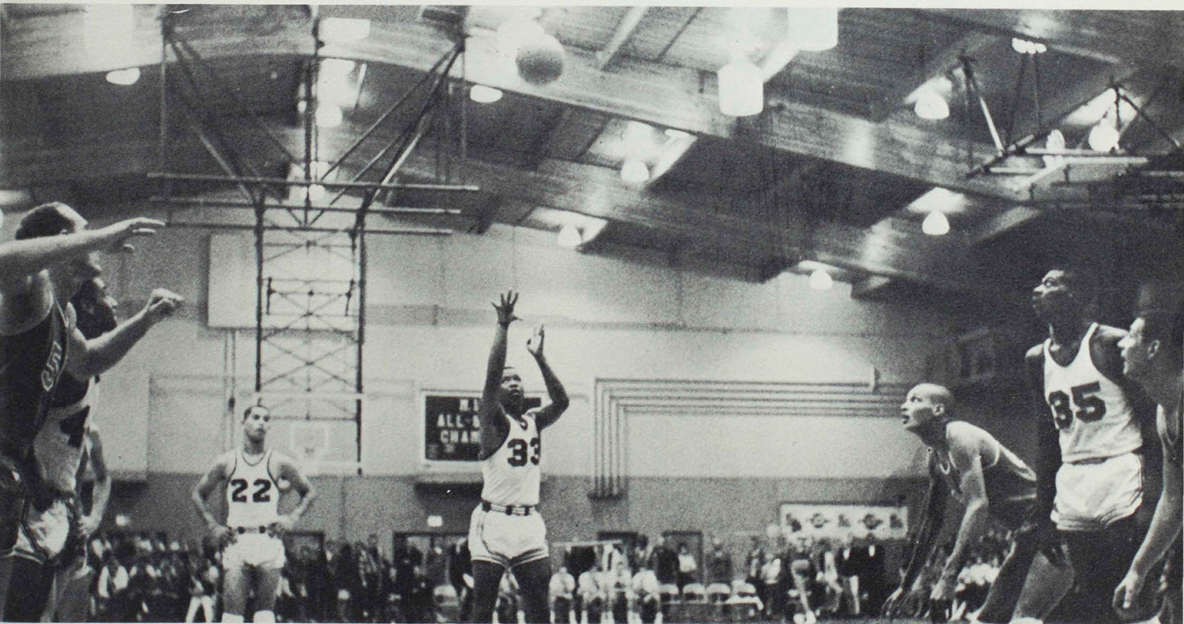

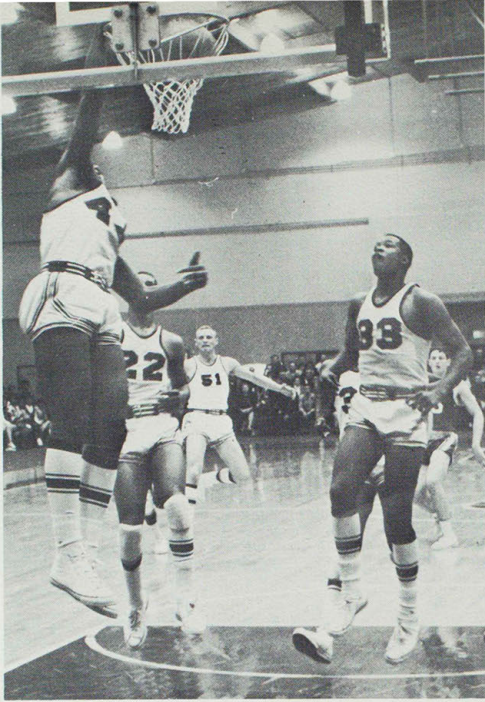
other squeaker for their fourth straight win by edging highly-regarded ROCKHURST, 69-65.

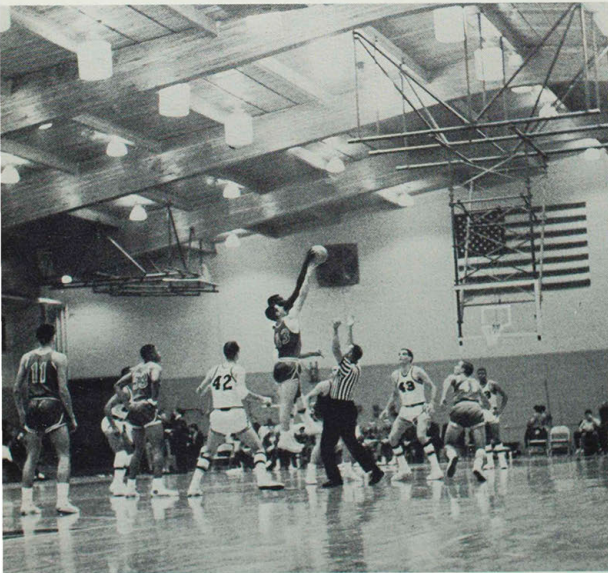

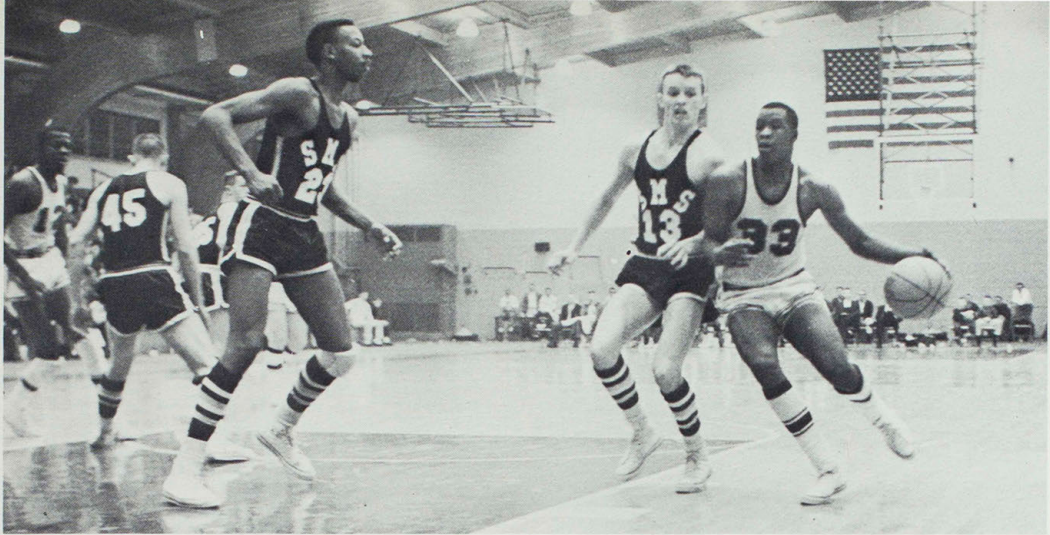

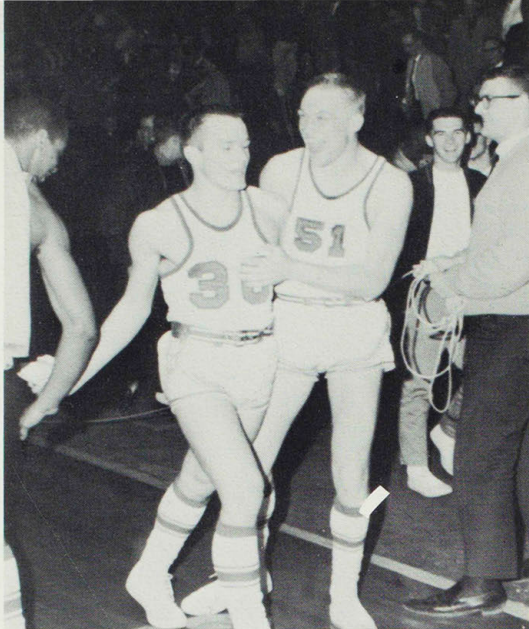


Floyd McMillon does a dance for the fans while waiting for a rebound.

Mules Edge 'Dogs' 81-80

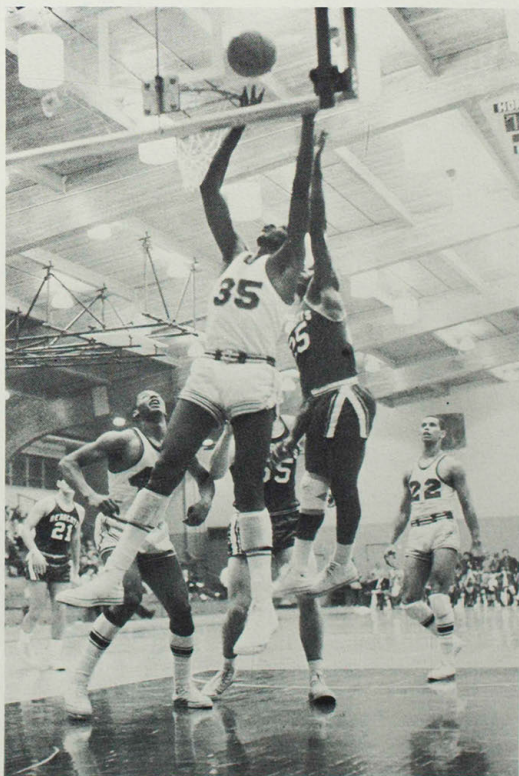

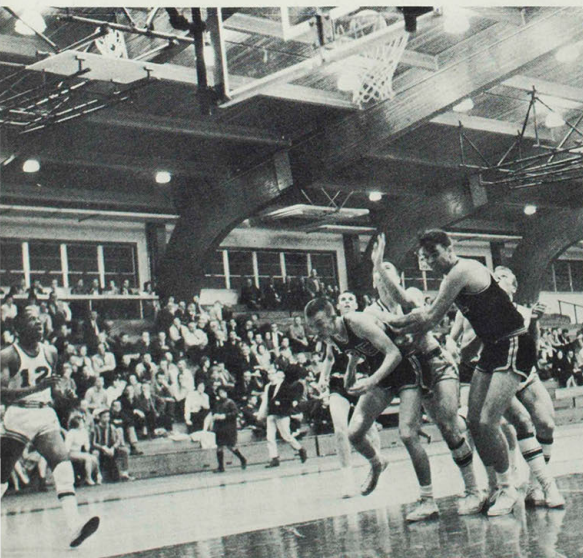


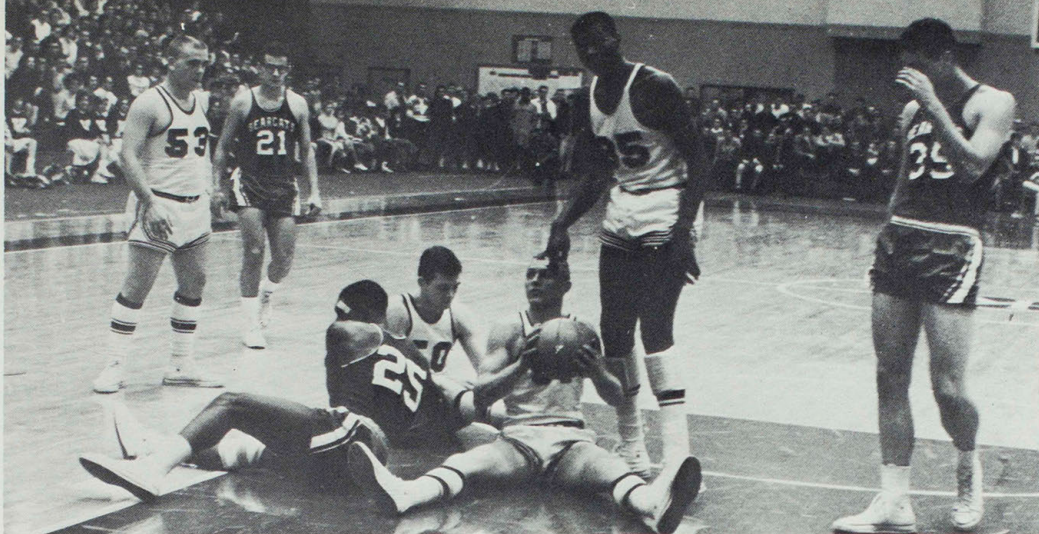
Larry Luett (51) congratulates teammate, Tom Bredensteiner (30), after his 60-foot shot which broke the school scoring record.

Cape Escapes 'Dogs in Four Overtimes

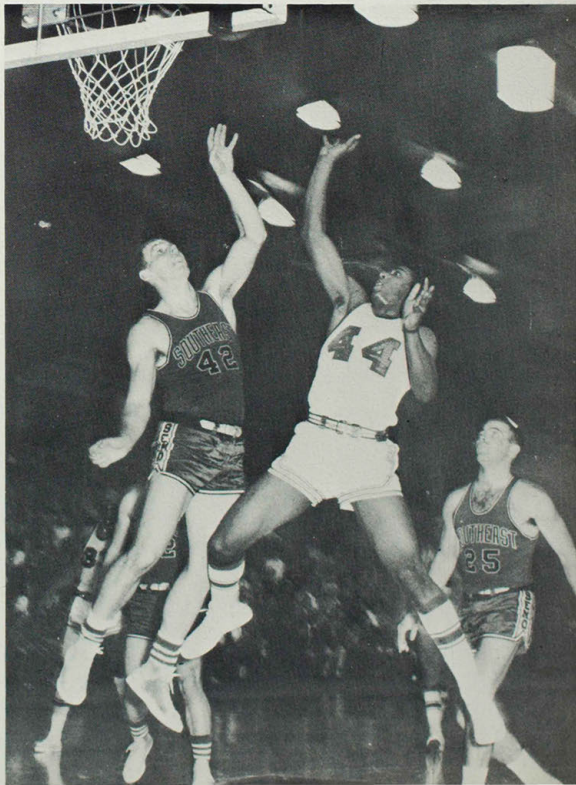

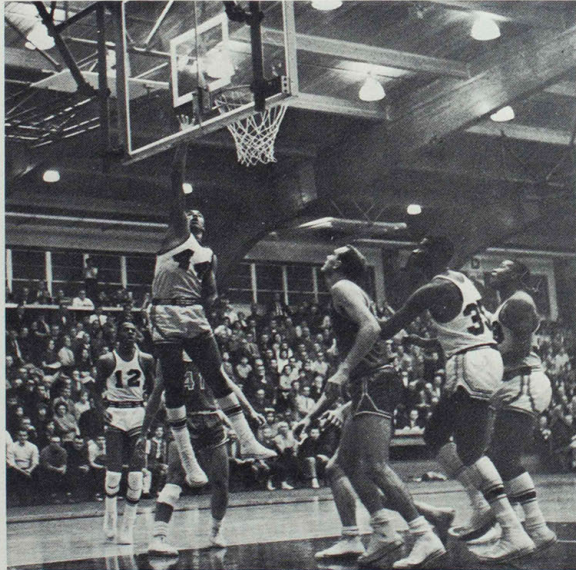


Larry Luett scores while teammate Floyd McMillon holds back Paul Ranson and Tom Drexler of Cape.

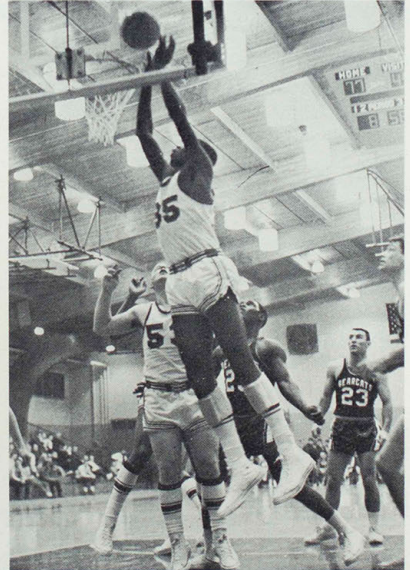




Larry Luett gains control from Maryville's Larry Robinson (25) in the Bulldog's win over the Bearcats.



High-jumping Dave Taylor flips in a two-pointer against the Quincy Hawks.

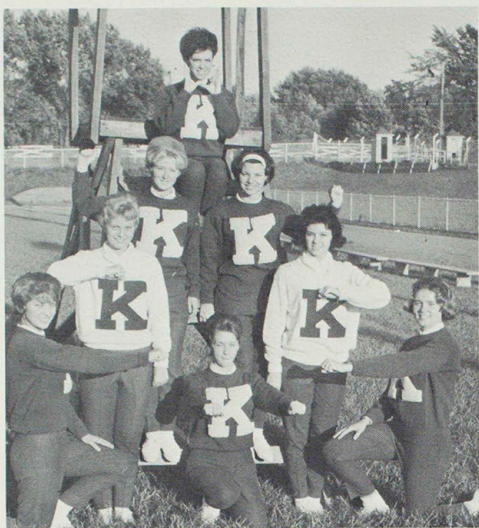

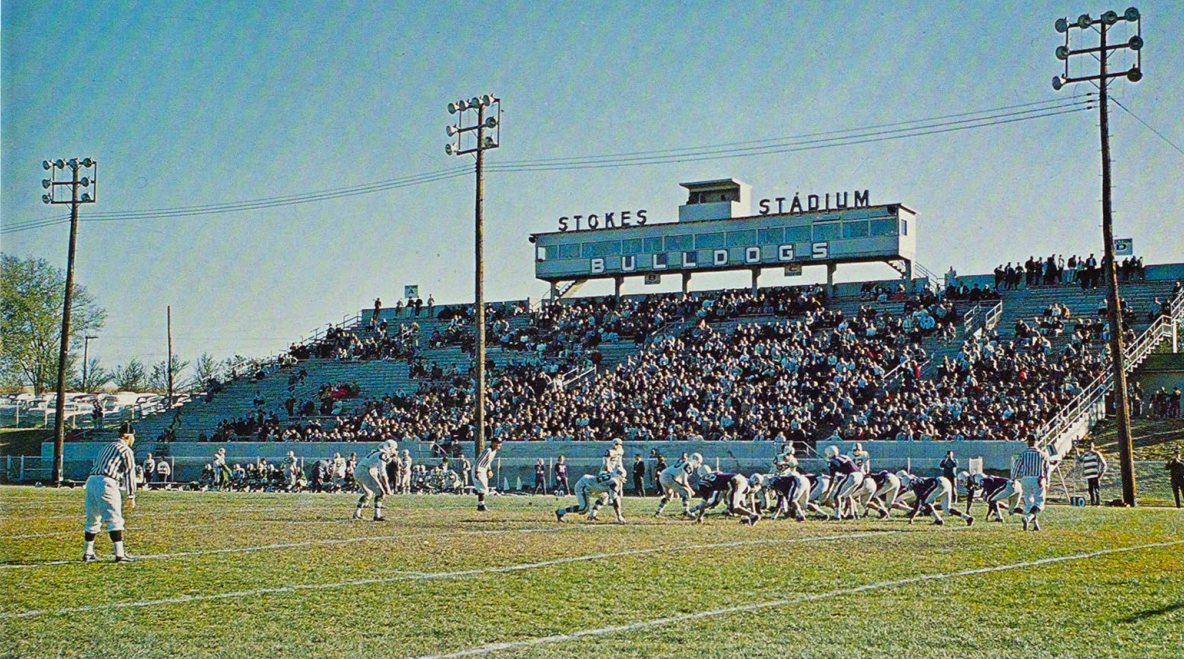

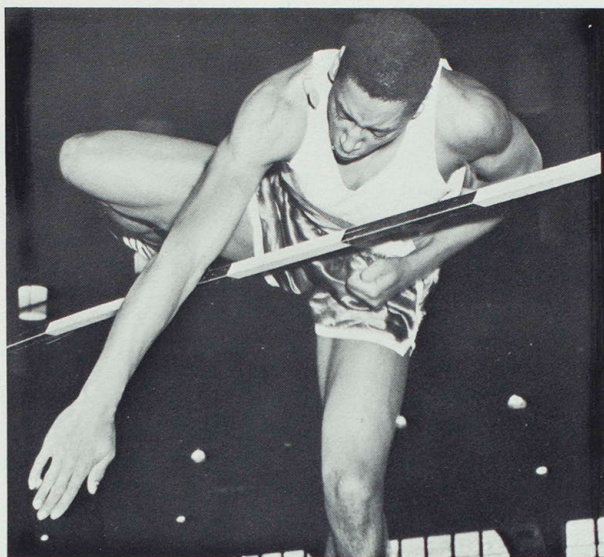

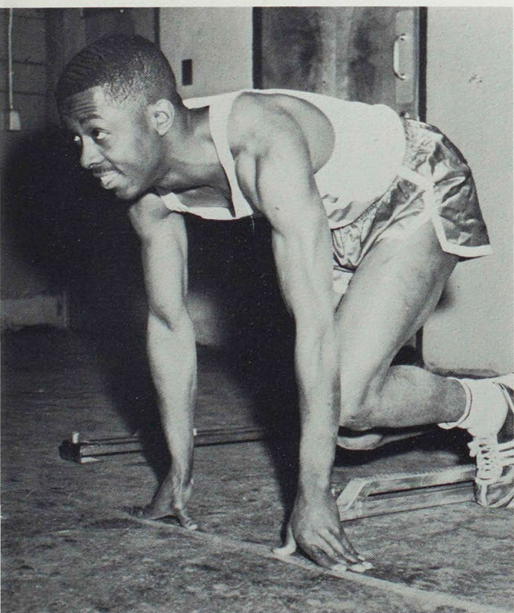

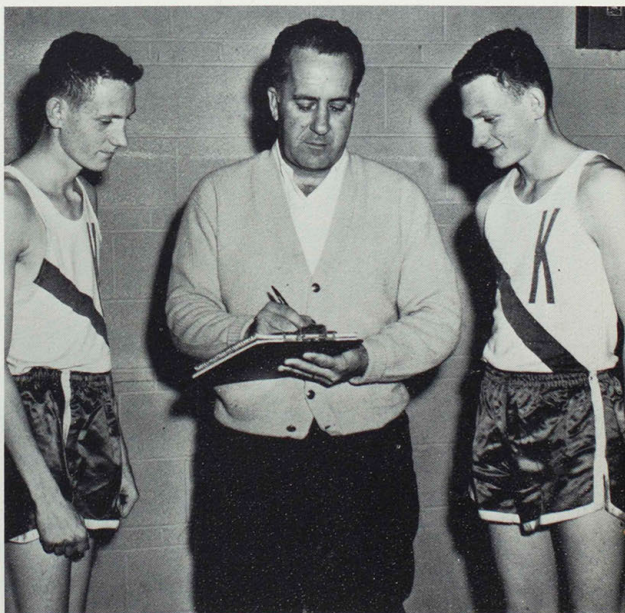

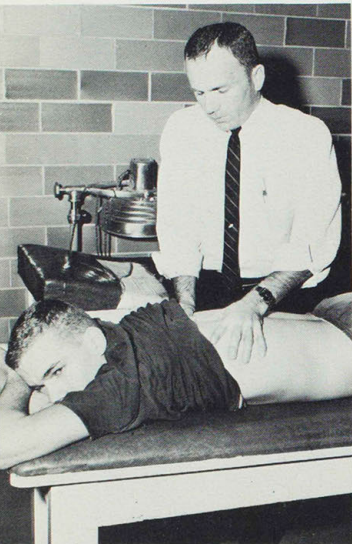

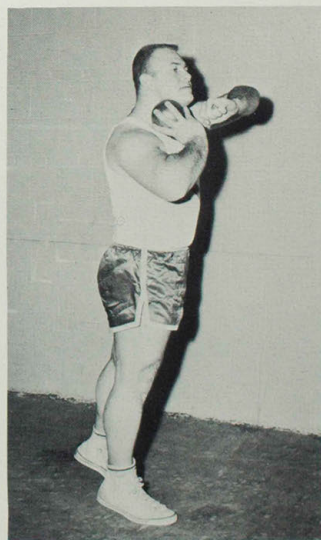

Schneider Leads Bulldog Harriers

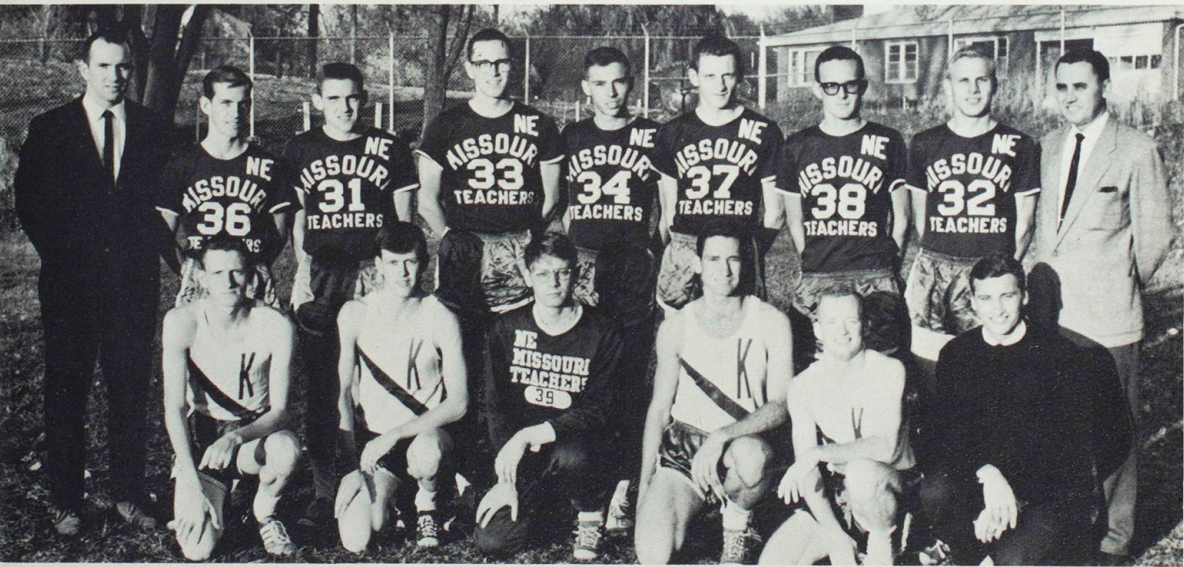

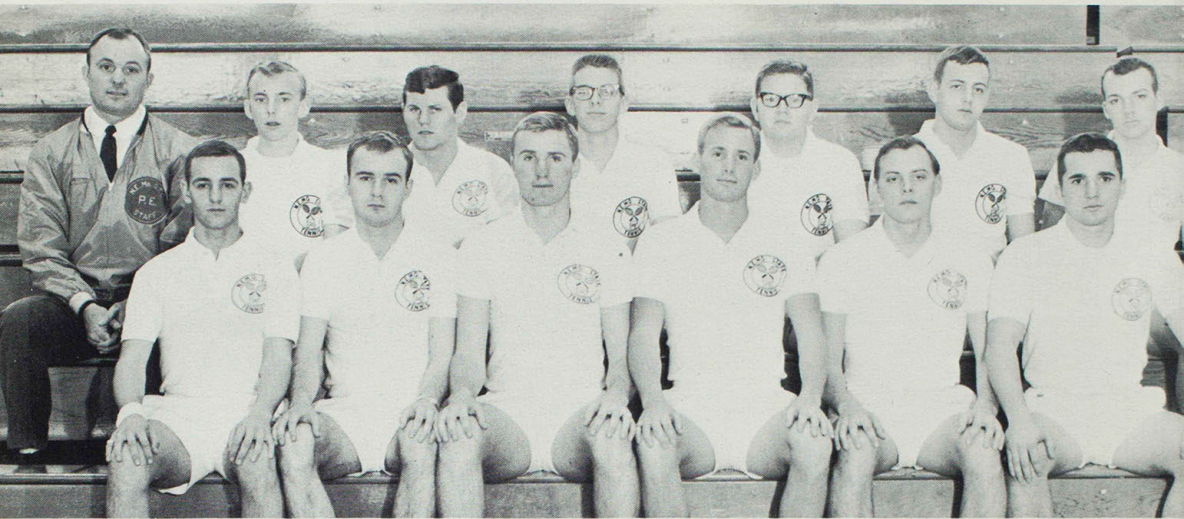

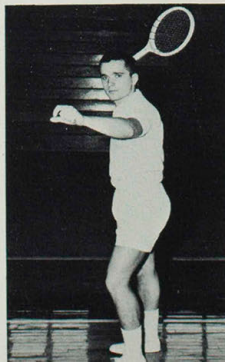

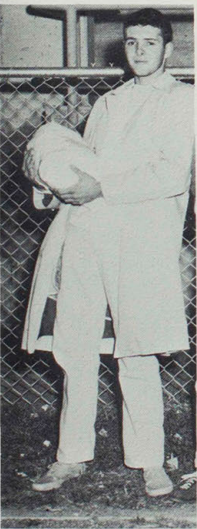

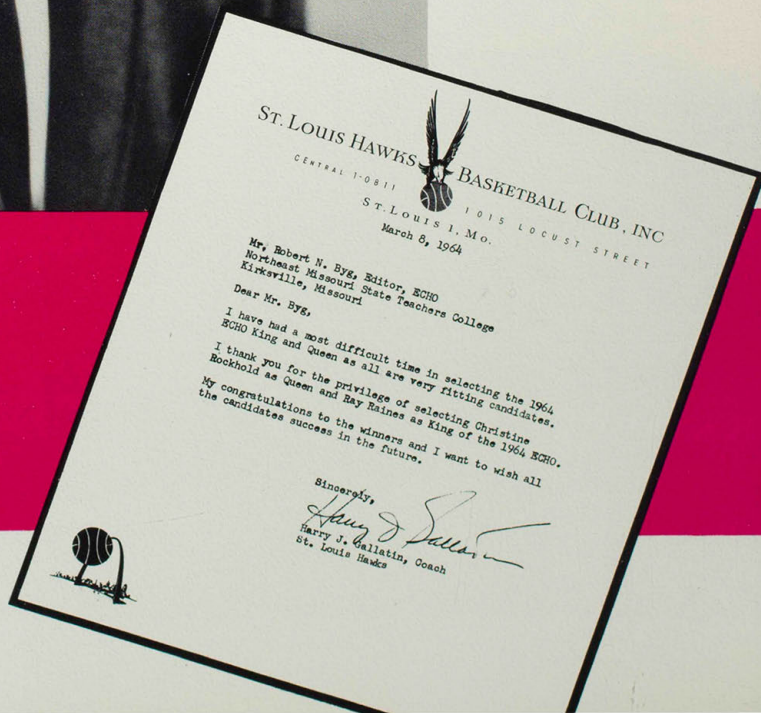
