TWO MISSOURI TEACHER ORGANIZATIONS will meet at NMSU this week. Seventy-five to 100 Missouri teachers are expected to attend the Missouri Unit of the Association of Teacher Education (MUATE) meeting Friday and Saturday. Dr. Martin Haberman, dean of the Division of Urban Outreach, University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and the University of Wisconsin Extension, will be guest speaker for the MUATE program at 7:30 p.m. Friday in the Georgian Room of the Student Union Building. Dr. Loren Grissom, professor of English education at NMSU, is president of MUATE. The Missouri Association of Colleges of Teacher Education (MACTE) will meet Thursday and Friday. Dr. Nell Sanders, director of the gifted and alternative programs, Missouri Department of Education, will be the guest speaker for the MCATE banquet at 7:30 p.m. Thursday in the Alumni Room of the SUB.
