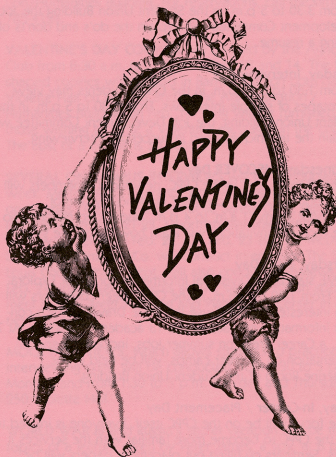

### **Monday, Resume Day**

From 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. in the CPPC, students may view videotapes of sample interviews. From 3:30 to 5 p.m. in the Student Union Building, the Job Development Committee will explain the techniques used in successful interviewing.

### **Wednesday, DISCOVER Day**

From 8 to 11 a.m. in the CPPC, new faculty members will be introduced to the computer guidance system of DISCOVER. From 11 a.m. to 4 p.m., undecided majors who have received invitations will learn how to use the system.
