## Lyceum Presents Elixir of Love

The Lyric Opera of Kansas City will perform Gaetano Donizetti's *The Elixir of Love*, in English, Oct. 11 at 8 p.m., in Baldwin Auditorium.

The Lyric Opera of Kansas City is a major musical organization ranked among the leading opera companies in the United States. Performing exclusively in English and using professional American artists, the Lyric Opera annually presents two repertory seasons of five operas, three in the fall and two in the spring. In addition, the Lyric Opera tours surrounding states after its regular fall season and is an active participant in the Missouri River Festival of the Arts.

With Russell Patterson as general artistic director, the Lyric Opera celebrates its silver anniversary of touring making the Lyric the oldest touring program in the Midwest. The Lyric's touring production in no way differs from the opera presented to Kansas City audiences and to national reviewers.

Written in less than two weeks, this romantic comedy is considered to be Donizetti's most enduring work.

*The Elixir of Love* is the lyrical love story of Nemorino, a peasant boy, and his pursuit of a sophisticated and beautiful woman, Adina. With the help of a scheming but lovable quack, Dr. Dulcamara and his magical potion, Nemorino wins the affections of Adina. Dr. Dulcamara's business booms and Nemorino and Adina live happily ever after.

The role of the lovesick Nemorino will be sung by John Daniecki. Appearing last fall in the Lyric's performances of *Regina* and *Don Pasquale*, Daniecki has also toured with the Lyric as Tonio in the 1988 production of *The Daughter of the Regiment*. Sharon Daniels, Lyric Opera veteran, will sing the role of Adina. Daniels has been performing with the Lyric for more than 13 years. Her recent Lyric roles include *Birdie* in *Regina* and Mabel in *The Pirates of Penzance*. Singing the role of the wily Dr. Dulcamara will be Dan Sullivan. Mr. Sullivan has sung with numerous opera companies throughout the United States including New York City Opera, Houston Grand Opera, Opera Theatre of Saint Louis and Lyric

Opera of Chicago. Sullivan is listed in the current *Who's Who* in Opera. David Small will sing Sergeant Belcore, another of Adina's admirers. Small appeared last spring as Schlemil in *The Tales of Hoffman* and Lt. Cholmondely in *The Yeomen of the Guard* and toured with the Lyric in the 1989 production of *La Bobeme*, which was performed at Northeast last year.

Last year's touring production of *La Bobeme* received praise from around the region.

Free tickets for students, faculty and staff for *The Elixir of Love* will be available in the Students Activities Office, SUB, beginning Oct. 8. Financial assistance for this performance has been provided by the Missouri Arts Council, a state agency.

The Bacchae recounts the mythical struggle of the tyrannical king of Thebes, Pentheus, against accepting the power of the god, Dionysos. The conflict which ends in horrifying disaster for Pentheus and his family illustrates the Greek concept that goodness is achieved through a balance in all moral factors and that there should be nothing in excess.
