Lyceum Presents Syndicated Columnist



The Lyceum Series will present William Raspberry, *Washington Post* columnist, Feb. 20 at 8 p.m. in Baldwin Auditorium. Raspberry, dubbed "the Lone Ranger of columnists" for his controversial writings, has received a variety of awards, from the Capital Press Club's "Journalist of the Year" to several Front Page Awards from The Washington/Baltimore Newspaper Guild.

Raspberry began his career at *The Washington Post*, in 1962, as a teletype operator and continued up through the

ranks as police and court reporter, copy editor and city editor. In 1965, after covering the Watts riots, he received national attention and was asked to begin as a column writer. In 1966, he began the "Potomac Watch." Today, Raspberry's column is carried by 175 newspapers, and it addresses the latest issues and proposals for answers to social issues.

Tutoring Program Under Way

Several Northeast students are voluntarily returning to junior high school. The students are not going there to learn, they are tutoring Kirksville Junior High School students who need extra help in their classes.

Robin Lukefahr of Academic Planning Services, Gwen Blotevogel, assistant to the professor in Missouri South College, and Mary Duncan, a counselor at the junior high school, coordinated the program. Information about the program was provided for the residents through their resident advisers and through letters. Interested students were then sent to Duncan, who matched them with a junior high student.

Approximately seven NMSU students began tutoring in late November. Tutors work one-on-one with a junior high student for one hour, five days a week. So far, the response from the junior high students has been good.

"More students have asked to work with a college student," Duncan said.

The response from the NMSU students has also been favorable.

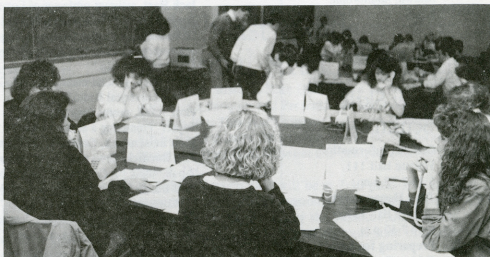
James McBain, a sophomore psychology/child development major, said "They (the junior high students) didn't like staying after school, but we had a good time."

Freshman Adam Grampp volunteered because he is interested in helping younger people. He believes that the program benefits everyone involved.

"It gives us a chance to get out into

the Kirksville community. Also, it helps the students to work with someone who is more on their wavelength," Grampp said.

A recital featuring winners of the evaluations and fellowship competition, NMSU piano faculty and NMSU piano students will be at 7 p.m. in Baldwin Auditorium.
