St. Louisian named to Board



James E. (Bud) Moulder of St. Louis, chairman emeritus for Booker Associates Inc., has been named to Northeast's Board of Governors by Gov. John Ashcroft. Moulder replaces Frederick Lauer of Raytown, Mo., whose term expired.

Moulder entered the consulting engineering practice in 1956 with Smith and Gillespie Engineers in Jacksonville, Fla. He joined Booker in 1961. He was named vice president and elected to the board of directors in 1963. He was named executive vice president in

1966, president in 1973, chairman of the board in 1977 and chief executive officer in 1980. He currently serves as a

senior consultant to the chairman and chief executive officer and remains a member of the board of directors.

Moulder served in the U.S. Marine Corps following graduation from Camdenton High School. He also served two years in the U.S. Army during the Korean conflict. He holds bachelor's and master's degrees in civil engineering from the University of Missouri-Columbia.

Moulder's professional affiliations include the American Consulting Engineers Council, the American Society of Civil Engineers, the Society of American Military Engineers, the Missouri Parks and Recreation Association and the Highway Engineers Association of Missouri.

In 1981 and 1982, he was the recipient of the St. Louis Professional Engineer in Private Practice and Engineer of the Year award, respectively. In 1988, he was awarded a Professional Engineer in Private Practice (PEPP) Merit award by the PEPP division of the National Society of Professional Engineers for his outstanding contributions to the field.

Moulder served as a member of the Missouri Coordinating Board for Higher Education from 1978 to 1982.

Moulder and his wife, Eldora, have two sons.

Northeast ranked among best colleges

Northeast Missouri State University is featured in the *U.S. News & World Report* 1991 college guide America's Best Colleges. Northeast was ranked 13th among the top regional colleges and universities in the Midwest.

The regional colleges and universities category is defined as schools which "generally award more than half their bachelor's degrees in two or more occupational or professional disciplines.

The rankings were based on statistical data provided by the institutions combined with a *U.S. News* reputational survey.

The statistical data included selectivity of the student body; the degree to which the school financially supports a high-quality, full-time faculty; overall financial resources; and the level of student satisfaction.

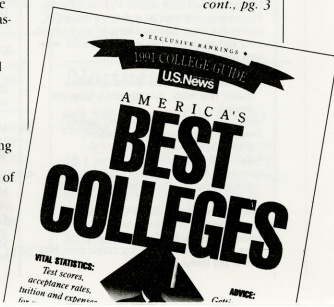
Selectivity was based in part on the 1989 entering freshman class: the percentage of applicants who were accepted, the percent of those accepted who actually enrolled, high school class standings and the average combined scores on either the Scholastic Aptitude Test or the composite American College testing Assessment.

Faculty resources were measured by the ratio of full-time students to full-time faculty; the percentage of full-time faculty with doctorates; the percentage of faculty with part-time status and the average salary, including all fringe benefits, for tenured full professors. The American Association of University Professors provided the information on faculty salaries.

The 1989 dollar total of its educational and general expenditures, divided by its total enrollment

determined the strength of the school's financial resources.

Student satisfaction was measured by the average percentage of the 1982 to 1984 freshman classes who graduated. *cont., pg. 3*

MLP seeks Residence Director

The Missouri London Program is currently accepting applications for a residence director for the 1991-92 academic year. Program dates for 1991-92 are Sept. 5 to Dec. 19, 1991 (fall term), and Jan. 9 to April 23, 1992 (spring term). The resident director is the equivalent of a resident adviser.

The application form is available from Seymour Patterson, associate professor of economics, McClain Hall 111 B, 785-4360. Also required with the application is an application letter, which includes a statement of the appropriateness of London as a site to achieve your academic or professional goals and a current visa. Three reference letters must be sent directly to the consortium moderator. Application deadline is Dec. 1.

In addition, the applicant must be post-baccalaureate, but need not currently be enrolled in a graduate program. Preference is given to applicants with international and residence assistance experience.

The benefits of being appointed residence director are two round-trip tickets from the United States to London, room in the student residence and a stipend of \$1,000 per semester.

Computer network planned

A consortium of Missouri's four-year colleges and universities has been established to implement MORENET, the Missouri Research and Education Network. This "electronic highway" will link Northeast with eight other state-supported institutions in Missouri, and provides access to national and international computer networks.

Current plans call for the fully functional computer network to be in place by September 1991. The network will provide Northeast's faculty, staff and students with direct access to library databases, specialized computer facilities, such as supercomputers, and numerous other research databases. MORENET will also give the member campuses access to both BITNET and INTERNET, which allow electronic communication with campuses across the United States and in foreign countries.

A major funding source for the new network is a \$215,000 National

Science Foundation Grant. David Rector, director of computer services, served as one of the co-principal investigators for the grant proposal, and has been elected vice chair of the MORENET Board of Directors.

CPA pass-rates among nation's top

Northeast's accounting graduates ranked eighth in the country according to pass-rates for all subjects on the Certified Public Accountant examination taken in May 1989. The September 1990 issue of *New Accountant* highlighted the results from the May and November 1989 exams. More than 1,000 colleges were represented among the candidates taking the 1989 examination.

Candidates must pass the examination with a grade of 75 or higher on each of four subjects (auditing, business law, accounting theory and accounting practice) in order to become certified public accountants. Among pass-rates on individual examination subjects, Northeast ranked fifth in Business Law with 72.7 percent.
