EMPLOYEES at Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine (KCOM) have challenged NMSU employees to a contest for United Way contributions. Each institution has approximately the same number of employees and total payroll, and the United Way goal for both is \$10,500. Charles Krueger, United Way divisional chairman for KCOM, issued the "friendly challenge" last week to Ed Carpenter, NMSU campaign chairman, saying that KCOM employees are determined to be the first to meet their goal.

The NMSU \$10,500 goal is a 5% increase over last year's, and amounts to 11.4% of the total United Way goal for Adair County. The advance campaign for NMSU began yesterday, and the general campus campaign is scheduled to begin Oct. 5.

Carpenter is enthusiastic about the United Way and the challenge. "We are on the line, and our institutional pride is involved, and so I hope that NMSU employees and students will respond promptly when they receive their pledge cards," he said.

The first copy of a student's transcript will be provided free of charge; each copy thereafter costs \$1. This new policy eliminates the issuance of transcripts free to graduates of NMSU. Students requesting a transcript should not expect the transcript to be ready in less than three days.

ALL STUDENTS planning to graduate during the 1978 school year (December, May, or August) are urged to complete and file placement papers as soon as possible. The Bureau of Placements is receiving calls daily for second semester candidates, and will soon be preparing for the 1978 employment year. Those filing early will find that credentials will be processed and available to employing officials when they are requested. Those waiting until later in the year may find unavoidable delays as the busy employment season approaches, Kathleen Bohon, Bureau of Placements, said.

STUDENTS WHO HAVE COMPLETED A MINIMUM OF 90 SEMESTER HOURS toward a Bachelor of Science in Education degree are eligible to do substitute teaching. Each fall the Bureau of Placements compiles a list of those people who have some time during the school week to substitute in the area schools.
