The evaluation will be based on four criteria; the effectiveness of the University's mission, resources, instructional programs and future planning. The evaluation includes instructional as well as academic support services. Nearly 100 faculty and staff were involved in a self-study during the 1983-84 academic year, drafting sectional reports for a four-chapter report based on the criteria. Jack Magruder, Science, was the Steering Committee chairman. The four criteria committees were chaired by Bryce Jones, Business; Jack Reiske, Education; Candy Young and Stuart Vorkink, Social Science. The NCA Evaluation Team will be David Curtis, vice president for academic affairs at Governors State University; Mary Ann Carroll, dean of the School of Graduate Studies at Indiana State University; Austin Doherty, academic dean and vice president for academic affairs at Alverno College; Nelva Runnalls, dean of curriculum, research and graduate studies at the University of Wisconsin-Stout; and John Harris, professor of Christian education at David Lipscomb College.
