Undergraduate Research Exposed

Recipients of 1989-90 undergraduate research stipends will make presentations at the 1990 NMSU Undergraduate Research Symposium, 12:30-5 p.m., April 9, in the SUB.

The symposium was developed in 1988 primarily for science presentations, but became a campus-wide event last year. Nearly all academic divisions will be represented at the symposium, as they have students working under research stipends. Between 60 and 80 15-minute presentations will be given throughout the afternoon, and a complete schedule will be available one week prior to the event. Also, abstracts of each research project will be published in a brochure and available at the symposium.

Each of the 63 students currently working under research stipends is required to make a presentation at the symposium. In addition, the 33 students who had research stipends during summer 1989 are invited to make presentations.

Writer's Digest Features Chariton Review

"What magazines shape our fiction outlook? Our society? And more to the point, which publications do editors and agents read when they're taking the pulse of our literary culture or searching for new talent?"

According to a list provided in the April 1990 issue of *Writer's Digest*, the *Chariton Review* is one of the top 19 publications that "shape our fiction outlook" in this country. *Writer's Digest* asked more than 100 editors and agents

to identify these trend-setting magazines, and the list contained a wide variety of publications from *The New Yorker* to *Playboy* to *Prairie Schooner*.

Jim Barnes, professor of comparative literature, has been editor of *The Chariton Review* since he founded it in 1975. Published in spring and fall, it has a circulation of more than 7,000. The journal contains fiction, poetry, essays and translations.

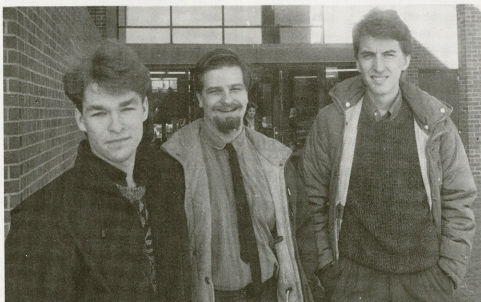
