University Offers London Study

The Missouri London Program (MLP), a study abroad program, is accepting applicants for the 1989 fall semester and the 1990 spring semester. Students can earn from 12-15 academic credits that may be used to satisfy general education and other degree requirements.

Courses for 1989-90 will be offered in economics, history, philosophy, literature, accounting, architecture and several other academic disciplines. The courses are taught in London by faculty from the Missouri universities that are members of the Missouri Consortium for International Studies.

Because curriculum, standards and styles will be familiar, NMSU students will join other Missouri students in a familiar academic environment.

Support services for the MLP are provided by the International Enrichment Corp. Jack Ricard of International Enrichment will be on campus from 10 a.m.-3 p.m., May 1, in the Student Union Building to discuss the program with all interested faculty and students.
