UNITED STATES SENATOR Thomas Eagleton (D-Mo.) will visit NMSU Monday, April 10. All faculty, staff and students are invited to meet Sen. Eagleton from 2:30-4 p.m. in the Georgian Room of the Student Union Building. Missouri's senior Senator was first elected to the United State Senate in 1968. He was elected circuit attorney of St. Louis in 1956, Attorney General of Missouri in 1960 and Lieutenant Governor of Missouri in 1964.

RESIDENCE HALL CONTRACTS may be signed beginning today through Thursday, April 13, on First Floor, Kirk Building. During this time, students may receive hall, room and possibly roommate assignments for fall 1978. Because of an expected increase in demand for residence hall living and increased freshman enrollment, any student that does not sign a residence hall contract by April 13 will be placed on a waiting list for fall and will not be assigned a hall until all freshmen have been guaranteed a space. Contracts may be cancelled without losing room deposits by notifying the Housing Office in writing before June 19.

Students should follow these guidelines:

- April 6-7--Students desiring to retain their present room and hall should register between 9-11:30 a.m. and 1:30-4:30 p.m.
April 10-11--Students desiring a room change in their present hall should register between 9-11:30 a.m. and 1:30-4:30 p.m.
April 12--Students desiring a hall change must register between 9-11:30 a.m. and 1:30-4:30 p.m.
April 13--Students who missed signing up for an assignment or who desire to change their original assignment, or who live off-campus must register from 9-11:30 a.m. only.

They will speak at seminars from 1:30-3:30 p.m. in 266 Violette Hall. FEI Day will conclude with a Free Enterprise Dinner-Conference at 6:30 p.m. at the Shamrock Inn. Guest speakers Dr. Richard Judd, deputy director of revenue in Missouri, and Dr. Gerald Stark of the University of Missouri-Columbia will discuss "Government Regulation and the Small Businessman." Admission to the dinner is \$3.75 per person.

A RETIREMENT RECEPTION will be held in honor of Mrs. Rose Shanight, assistant professor of home economics education, from 7-9 tonight in the Home Management House, 202 E. Patterson. A FILM FESTIVAL will highlight the second annual Anthropological Field Day today and Friday. Films about primitive cultures will be shown at 7 p.m. in the Tangerine Room of the Student Union Building. Tonight a 90-minute film called "People of the Seal" will show the lifestyle of the Netsilik Eskimo. Friday night a double feature will be shown including "Lost Tribes of Mindanao" about the tribal peoples of the remote Phillipine Islands and "The Feast" about the Yanomamo, tropical forest Indians of Venezuela and Brasil. Refreshments will be served. Social Science Division, Student Activities Board and Audio-Visual Services are sponsoring the event.

A FACULTY GONG SHOW will be presented at 7:04 tonight in Baldwin Auditorium. Guest panelists include Ray E. Klingensmith, dean of administration and general counsel; Tom Churchwell, assistant dean of instruction; and Judy Lundberg, freshman counselor. Participating instructors will represent the following academic divisions: Business, Education, Home Economics, Language and Literature, Social Science, and Nursing. Senior Emmett Vaughn will serve as master of ceremonies. Admission to the show will be 50 cents and proceeds will be donated to a local charity.
