... if you like football

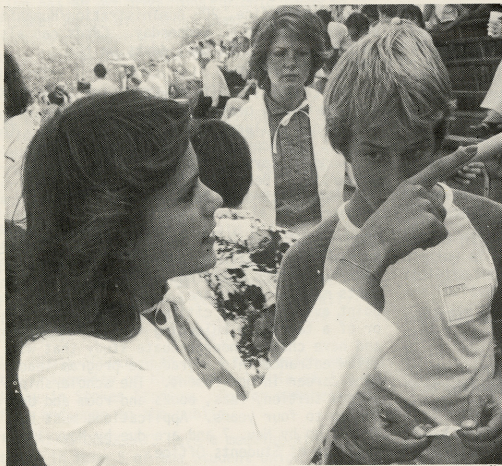

action, while others never get to see the game.

The cheerleaders, security personnel, game announcers, concession stand employees, and ticket takers all provide a service to the fans. Emergency medical personnel stand by in case of an accident and members of the press record the event for people to review later.

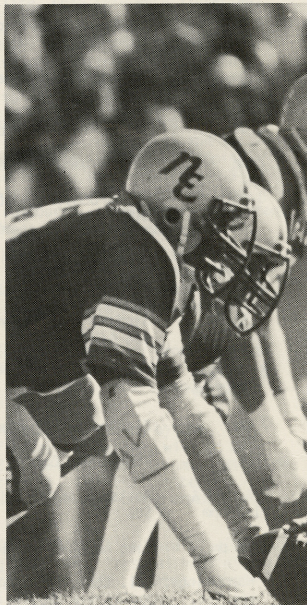
Although their names are not on the roster, these people are almost members of the team. No one comes to see them perform, but without them football games just wouldn't be the same.

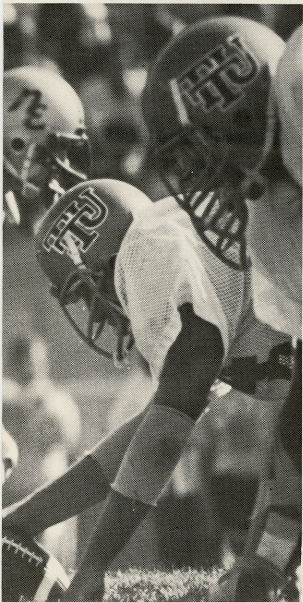
An ambulance crew doesn't have it rough all the time and watch the game, staying close to their equipment.

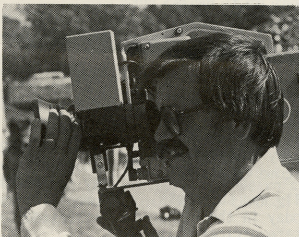
