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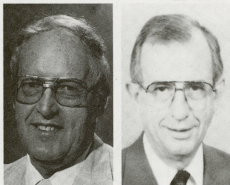

Warren Announces Appointments

President Russell Warren announced that W. Jack Magruder, acting dean of instruction, has been permanently appointed to that position, with the title change of vice president for academic affairs, Sept. 7. Magruder was named acting dean in 1989 when then-Vice President for Academic Affairs and Dean of Instruction Darrell Krueger was named president of Winona (Minn.) State University.

According to University sources, Magruder's appointment was based on consultation with division heads and key faculty, who felt the right person for the position was already in place.

1964. He has served as head of the Division of Science since 1986. He received his bachelor's from Northeast, his master's from the University of

Northern Iowa and his doctorate from the University of Northern Colorado.

Warren also announced the appointment of Director of External Affairs R. Russell Harrison to acting director of public relations. Jim Nevins, business manager, will assume Harrison's duties as director of the Student Union Building.

Harrison has been at the University since 1955. During that time, he has served as director of publicity, director of alumni activities and director of public services. He received his bachelor's from Northeast and has completed some graduate work at Northeast and the University of Nebraska.

Lyceum Presents Dixieland Band

The River City Ramblers, a Dixieland band from St. Louis, will perform at 8 p.m., Sept. 20, in Baldwin Auditorium as part of the 1990-91 Lyceum Series. Free tickets for students, faculty and staff will be available Sept. 17 through 20 in the Student Activities Board Office, SUB. Financial assistance for this performance has been provided by the Missouri Arts Council, a state agency.

The group members include Bob Ceccarini, the group's leader and trumpet player; "Red" Lehr, tuba; John Becker, banjo; Pat Joyce, piano; Joe Buerger, drums; and Scott Alberici, clarinet.

Since 1968, Ceccarini has been principal trumpet with the St. Louis Municipal Opera Orchestra and toured with the international company of "A Chorus Line." Lehr is recognized as one of the finest jazz sousaphonists in the world and performs on occasion with Richard Hayman and the St. Louis Symphony Pops Orchestra. Becker, former music consultant with NBC television affiliate

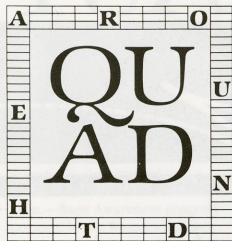
KSDK in St. Louis, has retired to devote all of his time to performance. Joyce normally performs 40 to 50 hours per week and is a regular at the Mid-America Jazz Festival held annually in St. Louis.

Buerger has performed with the St. Louis Philharmonic Orchestra and was recently a guest artist at the annual National Association of Jazz Educators convention. Clarinet player Alberici

has been compared to a young Benny Goodman and has performed at many jazz festivals.

The group combines humor with music as they play such Dixieland favorites as "Sweet Georgia Brown," "St. Louis Blues" and "Waitin for the Robert E. Lee." One of the many highlights of the evening is Lehr's rendition of the famous "Tiger Rag," which he plays while wandering through the audience.

Jim Barnes, professor of comparative literature, will join the faculty of The Heart of America Writing Conference, sponsored by Avila College and Johnson County Community College, Nov. 2 and 3 in Kansas City, Mo. He will participate as a panel member and as a workshop leader.

Mary Sue Beersman, professor of mathematics, has been named to a planning committee to help develop the Actuarial Mathematics Faculty Forum. Other committee members are from the University of Wyoming, Ohio State, University of Texas and Lebanon Valley College. The Society of Actuaries will host the AMFF planning committee at their October meeting in Orlando, Fla. Plans call for the planning committee to meet separately to set goals and priorities and then to meet with the Society of Actuaries' Board and other leaders to discuss cooperative efforts in actuarial education.

Keith Doubt, assistant professor of sociology, had a paper titled "Autonomy and Responsibility in Social Theory" published in *Current Perspectives in Social Theory*, Vol. 10, 1990. The paper explicates the significance of good will for the sociological theorizing of Jurgen Habermas.

Darryl Egley, mathematics professor, has had two cartoons, "Zorn's Llama" and "Acute Math Anxiety," accepted by *The College Journal of Mathematics* for publication.

Editors of *Voices International*, *Kansas Quarterly* and *The Charlton Review* have notified **Jim Thomas**, professor of language and literature, that they will publish three of his poems, "Older Brother," "Dream Hungers" and "Black Well," in forthcoming issues. Thomas' book *Seed Time*, *Harvest Time* will be available in local book stores in early October.

Dr. Paul Parker will discuss the "shift by the (Supreme) Court in 1937 toward a greater protection of rights of individuals" at 3:30 p.m., Sept. 12, and will look at more recent court rulings in order to "speculate" upon these questions: "Did the revolution of 1937 generate a counterrevolution of the 1980s? Can we truly understand either of these apparent shifts by the court as revolutionary, or is this simply the result of shifting political fortunes? The answer to these questions might provide suggestive answers to whether we can expect a counter-counterrevolution of the 2010s." This lecture is a part of the Liberal Arts and Sciences Lecture Series that will focus on revolution this year.
