LEONARD NIMOY, co-star of the science fiction television series "Star Trek," will present a program at 8 p.m. Thursday in Baldwin Auditorium as part of the University Lyceum Series. Nimoy's program "Spock and I" will compare the television role with the man himself. Nimoy has also appeared in various roles in the television series "Mission Impossible." On stage, he has appeared in many plays including "The King and I" and "Fiddler on the Roof." In addition to acting, Nimoy is a talented director, writer and photographer. Tickets for Thursday's program will be available from 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Thursday in the Student Union Building Office and are free to students, faculty and staff members.

THE REGIONAL SCIENCE FAIR of Northeast Missouri will be on Thursday in the Pershing Building.
