THE "SPACE AGE CHILD" AND THE "T.V. BABY" were the phrases Dr. Loretta Long used to describe today's children in her presentation before the Northeast Missouri Teachers Association Friday. Better known as "Susan" on television's "Sesame Street", Dr. Long said it is important for today's teachers to build on their children's creativity and not to perpetuate the "one right answer syndrome" in the classroom. She stressed the importance of television as an educational medium and said that part of "Sesame Street's" success can be attributed to the fact that it builds educational concepts into what children like to do.
