THE FREE ENTERPRISE INSTITUTE is sponsoring two speakers today as part of Free Enterprise Day. At 9:30 a.m. in 111 Violette Hall, Norman Beal of Coors will make a multimedia presentation entitled "Coors and the Free Enterprise System." At 2:30 p.m. in 121 VH, Dr. David Meltz, an attorney from Atlanta, Ga., will talk on "The Future of Free Enterprise Amidst Government Regulation." As part of the University Lyceum Series, Meltz also will speak at 8 tonight in 106 Laughlin Building on "Draft Registration in a Free Society--A Contradiction in Terms."

A CENTENNIAL EXHIBIT, film and panel discussion on "Einstein and the Eighties" will open Wednesday to be held through April 30 in Kirk Memorial. Quotations, facsimiles, photographs, diagrams and interpretive texts will combine to give a portrait of the physicist Albert Einstein, who lived from 1879 through 1955. Dr. Ollin Drennan, Rieger-Black distinguished professor of physics and natural science, and Dr. Shirley Morahan, project co-director, will be interviewed at 9 a.m. Tuesday on KIRX-AM's Area Scene. The exhibit will be open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily. In conjunction with the exhibit, a 40-minute film on Einstein will be shown every hour Wednesday and Thursday, and Monday and Tuesday, April 28-29, in Room 3 of the Student Union Building. The film may be viewed Friday through Sunday in Kirk Memorial. A display on Einstein will be set up today through April 28 in Pickler Memorial Library. As a special attraction, a panel discussion with Dr. Drennan, Dr. Henry Smits, associate professor of philosophy, and Dr. Heinz Woehlk, assistant professor of English, will be at 7 p.m. Monday, April 28, in Room 106 of Laughlin Building following a showing of the film. Dr. Robert Nothdurft, professor of physics, also directs the project funded by a grant from the Missouri Committee for the Humanities.
