Orchestra Makes 25th Appearance at Northeast



America's second oldest symphony orchestra, the highly acclaimed Saint

Louis Symphony Orchestra, will perform at 3 p.m., April 22, in Baldwin Auditorium. This will be the Orchestra's 25th appearance at Northeast and is a Lyceum Series presentation.

The Orchestra will present three pieces: "Handel's Zadok the Priest," "Coronation Anthem No. 1" performed with the Saint Louis Symphony Chorus; Bach's "Magnificat, BWV 243"; and Haydn's "Mass in B-flat major" (Theresienmesse).

Under the leadership of Leonard Slatkin, music director and conductor since 1979, the 101-member Orchestra has accumulated an impressive list of awards, honors and tributes, including recognition by *Time* magazine critic

Michael Walsh as one of the top two orchestras in the country.

Founded in 1880, the Orchestra's season has grown from its original six annual concerts to more than 240. Performances include 22 different concert series, including classical, chamber and pops; midwestern, national and international tours; educational concerts, the Saint Louis County Pops; a chamber music series; and Summerfest series.

Financial assistance for this event has been provided, in part, by the Missouri Arts Council and Union Electric. Free tickets for students, faculty and staff will be available beginning April 17 in the Student Activities Board Office, SUB.
