THE SPRING COMMISSIONING CEREMONY of the Military Science Division will honor 13 ROTC cadets who will receive commissions as second lieutenants in the U.S. Army. It will be held at 1:30 p.m. Friday in the Quiet Lounge of the Student Union Building. Rep. Harry Hill of the Second District will discuss "Leaders in More Ways Today" at the ceremony.

SPRING COMMENCEMENT for 834 undergraduate and graduate students will be at 10 a.m. Friday in Stokes Stadium. Coach Woody Hayes, formerly of Ohio State University, will deliver the address. The traditional academic procession will begin at 9:30 a.m. from Baldwin Auditorium. The undergraduate student with the highest grade point average will lay a wreath at the statue of Joseph Baldwin, the University's founder and first president. If it rains, Commencement will be held in Pershing Arena.

THE TRADITIONAL PINNING CEREMONY of the Nursing Division will recognize 31 graduating seniors at 7 p.m. Thursday in the Activities Room of the Student Union Building. Sister Teresa Noth, dean of the School of Nursing and Allied Health Professions at St. Louis University, will speak. Pinning confers an informal acceptance into the nursing profession.

A FACULTY MEMBER AND STAFF MEMBER have been honored for their outstanding service to students. They are Eugene Croarkin, associate professor of accounting, and Dale C. Schatz, vice-president. Nominations for the awards were made by individual students, screened by representatives of the Student Senate and final selection made by a six-member alumni panel.
