MISSOURI STUDENT GRANT checks for the 1984 fall semester have arrived and may be picked up at the cashier's window in the Administration/Humanities Building.

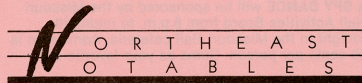

NORTHEAST MISSOURI STATE UNIVERSITY surpassed its 1985 United Way Fund Drive goal of \$17,500, by receiving more than \$18,050 from NMSU students, faculty, staff and emeriti faculty. **Janice Legg** and **Laura Hulse**, Business, were this year's campus co-chairmen. **Karla Ponder**, junior, was student chairman. Last year, NMSU raised \$2,000 more than its \$15,000 goal.
