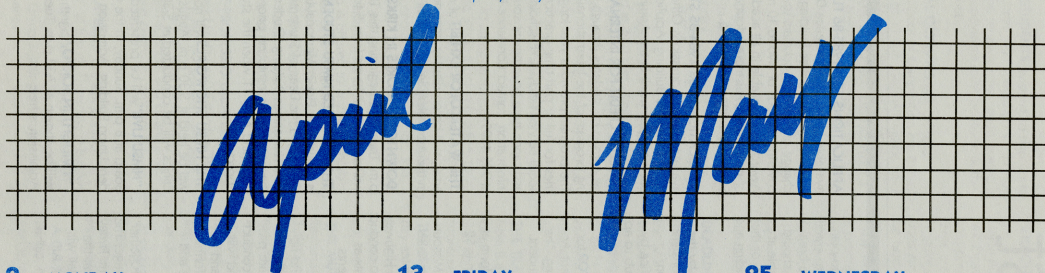
"NMSU LIVE" will be presented by the Student Activities Board at 8 p.m. Sunday, in the Georgian Room of the Student Union Building. Admission is free.
