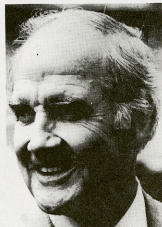

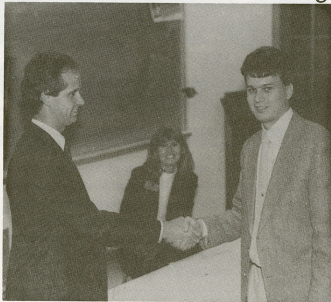

## MASSP Honors Richardson

The Missouri Association of Secondary School Principals awarded Gordon Richardson, professor of education, the first-ever Service to Secondary Education Award at the annual MASSP fall conference, Oct. 3, in Columbia, Mo.

The award was established this year to honor and recognize individuals in higher education, business, government and other vocations who have made significant contributions to the improvement of secondary education and to the professionalism of the secondary principalship.

Richardson currently heads the educational administration program at the University. He earned his bachelor degree and doctoral degrees from Purdue University.

Before becoming a part of the faculty at Northeast in 1970, Richardson was a teacher and high school principal in Indiana. He served as coordinator of research, evaluation and education specifications at the University of Iowa, as assistant director of the Iowa Educational Information Center, and as director of school administration at the University of North Dakota.

Richardson received the Phi Delta Kappa Distinguished Service Award in

1981 and is listed in the *Outstanding Educators of America* and *Who's Who in the Midwest*.

He has had numerous articles published in professional journals such as *The Hoosier School Master*, *School Business Affairs* and the *Missouri School Board Journal*. Richardson has also served as a consultant and presenter for the North Central Association evaluation teams in four states.

# McGovern Presentation Wednesday

"The Voice of the American Spirit," better known as Sen. George McGovern, will be heard on campus Wednesday evening. Sen. McGovern will speak on "The Presidency and the Election" at 8 p.m. Nov. 2 in Baldwin Auditorium. A reception in the SUB Activities Room will immediately follow the presentation; students, faculty and staff are invited to attend. The presentation is sponsored by the Lyceum Series.

A two-term member of the House of Representatives, a U.S. Senator for 18 years, and the 1972 Democratic Presidential nominee, George McGovern has long been identified with liberal causes and the Democratic Party. In 1960, McGovern was named by President John F. Kennedy as the first director of the Food for Peace Program. The success of this program helped propel him to the Senate in 1962.

During his first Senate term,

McGovern was one of the first in the U.S. Congress to openly oppose American involvement in the Vietnam War. He was closely allied with Sen. Robert Kennedy in his efforts to redirect the Johnson administration's position, and McGovern's leadership in the anti-war movement launched a grassroots call for his nomination as the 1972 Democratic candidate.

Also while in the Senate, McGovern served on the Agriculture, Nutrition and Forestry Committee. Virtually all major pieces of farm legislation during his Senate term bear his mark. He furthered agricultural discussion in his book, *Agricultural Thought in the 20th Century*.

McGovern has authored several other books including *A Time of War/A Time of Peace* and his autobiography, *Grassroots*, which outline his experience during those turbulent years in American history.

McGovern served on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee throughout the 1970s and was appointed by both Presidents Carter and Ford as a United Nations' delegate. In 1982, McGovern founded Americans for Common Sense, to provide an alternative political voice on behalf of minorities, the poor, and other marginalized Americans.

During World War II, McGovern completed 35 missions as a pilot, earning him the Distinguished Flying Cross. After the service, he pursued his doctorate at Northwestern University (Evanston, Ill.). He also holds a bachelor's from Dakota Wesleyan University, where he later taught as a professor of history.

## Ryle Named MIAA President

Walter H. Ryle, professor of history, was named president of the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association at the organization's 1988 fall meeting held in the Lake of the Ozarks, Sept. 14 and 15.

Ryle replaced John P. Mees, executive assistant to the president of Central Missouri State University, as president. Other officers for 1988-89 are Yvonne Hoard of Lincoln University, MIAA vice president and Jerry Hughes of Central Missouri State University, secretary.

Ryle has been a faculty representative to the MIAA for Northeast since 1973. During that time, he has served as chairman of Northeast's athletic committee and MIAA vice president.

Ryle and the other executive officers appoint institutional representatives from the universities

in the Association. In turn, the representatives choose three voting representatives. The 36-member board meets twice annually to conduct business.

The MIAA was established in 1912 with 14 members. In 1924, it was reorganized to include only the five regional state schools: Central Missouri State University, Northeast Missouri State University, Northwest Missouri State University, Southeast Missouri State University and Southwest Missouri State University. In July 1987, the MIAA admitted Missouri Southern State College, Missouri Western State College, Pittsburg State University and Washburn University to the Association. Although these schools were admitted, they were not able to participate in league play this fall.
