A SOCIAL SCIENCE LECTURE,

"World Civilization from the Point of View of the Author," will be given at 2:30 p.m. today, in Baldwin Hall Little Theatre. F. Willis will also speak at the Phi Alpha Theta and Historical Society banquet at 7 p.m. tonight, in the Spanish Room of the Student Union Building. He will speak on "France's Islands: Observing the End of an Empire."
