Another bouquet that is sure to be popular is a dozen heart shaped balloons. Marti Edwards, owner of Helium Happiness and Gifts, will deliver the foil balloons, in clown suit, painted face and all, for around \$12 a dozen. She may not be the FTD man, but she is sure to bring a smile.

Balloons are also being sold and delivered on campus by Sigma Sigma Sigma social sorority. "I think that they will go really well, because a female doesn't want to buy her boyfriend flowers," Janet March, sorority member, said. "It will be different."

Women who want to buy that very special gift might drop in to a men's clothing store for a pair of heart covered briefs or socks.

"All ages buy them. I've seen everyone from high school students to even a grandmother who bought them to give

to her grandsons, who were about 21 years old," said John Troester of Troester's Clothing Store.

The underwear can be purchased alone for five dollars or, for eight dollars, there is an additional surprise—a beating heart to wind up for the valentine in need of a transplant. "People want to do something different or wild," he said, "and they are not all that expensive; so, this is what they buy."

If all else fails, pick out a unique card—one, two or three. "I bought him three cards. One said what I wanted to say perfectly, then I found another one I liked and then another one," Becky Eckard, junior, said. "They all said different things that I wanted to tell him," she said. Cards range in price from 35 cents to \$2.50 for an elaborate one.

Chocolates in a lacy box always hit the spot, too, unless one's valentine is on a diet. Boxes of candy range from one dollar to \$20 in price.

Other than boxed chocolates, Kirlin's Candies have solid chocolate in a variety of forms such as a bone-shaped people biscuit for \$4.95; a love pill with 1000 mg. of chocolate for \$5.95; a red foil-wrapped heart and lips to send love and kisses for \$3.95; a "super kiss" five ounce chocolate kiss for \$3.95; or a big pair of "Hot Lips" for \$4.95.

To get away from such commercialization of Valentine's Day, Paula Presley, Kirksville resident, is using calligraphy to make valentines to order for students. She said people write a lot of their own poems, which give these gifts a nice personal touch.

Whatever one gets for Valentine's Day this year, whether it's homemade or store-bought, just remember: it's the thought that counts (even if it's not original!)
