Janice Legg, Business, gave a presentation "To Read, To Recognize, To Correct" (Proofreading and Editing), at the annual North-Central Business Education Association convention in Des Moines, Oct. 21.

Marianna Giovannini, Freshman Counseling, presented a program at the National Orientation Directors Association Conference in Burlington, Vt., titled "The Opinionnaire as an Orientation Tool," which focused on the procedures used and the results of the survey administered during the Summer Orientation Program.
