"THE FUTURE OF HISTORY" will be discussed by Dr. Arnita Jones, staff associate of the National Coordinating Committee for the Promotion of History, at 7:30 tonight in the Conference Room of the Student Union Building. Dr. Jones received her A.B. from Vanderbilt University and M.A. and Ph.D. from Emory University. Her appearance is sponsored by the history program of the Social Science Division and Phi Alpha Theta history honorary. NCCPH seeks to promote history as a major in undergraduate and graduate college programs and to help identify non-teaching jobs open to history majors.
