**The Fulbright College Faculty Exchange Program** offers grants in research and university lecturing abroad for professionals, retired faculty and independent scholars. The awards for

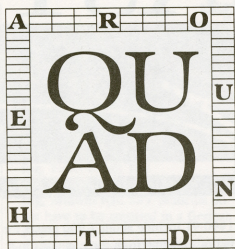

## Competitive Scholarships Available

**The Harry S. Truman Scholarship**, awarded to outstanding sophomore students pursuing a career in public service, covers tuition, fees, books, and room and board up to \$7,000 annually. Applicants must be U.S. citizens and have a 3.0 GPA. Northeast may nominate three candidates. Application materials are due Nov. 1, 1989.

**The Rhodes Scholarship**, awarded to exceptional seniors who wish to pursue two to three years of study at Oxford University, covers all tuition costs and provides a £4,860 annual allowance. Eligible seniors must be under 24 years of age, a U.S. citizen and complete a bachelor's degree by Oct. 1, 1990. Applications must be completed by Oct. 16, 1989.

**The Mellon Fellowships In The Humanities**, awarded to outstanding seniors or recent graduates who will pursue doctorates in the humanities, provide a stipend of \$11,500 plus payment of graduate school tuition. To be eligible, a senior or recent graduate must be a U.S. citizen and present evidence of outstanding academic promise in the humanities. Students interested

in the Mellon Fellowship must complete the initial stages of the application process by Oct. 16, 1989.

**The Fulbright Grants**, awarded to graduate students for study and research abroad in academic fields and creative and performing arts, range from one year of tuition, books, transportation and maintenance in a foreign country to a variety of partial grants. English teaching assistantships in Afghanistan, Ecuador, France and Germany are also available under the Fulbright program. To be eligible, an applicant must be a U.S. citizen, have sufficient proficiency in the language of the host country, and hold a bachelor's degree by the beginning date of the grant. Creative and performing artists may substitute four years of relevant training for the bachelor's degree. Fulbright applications must be received by Oct. 2, 1989.
