THE 145 INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS at the University this semester are active members of the student body both academically and non academically. Approximately 25 of them who were on campus last year have g.p.a.'s of 3.0 or better; five others have g.p.a.'s of 2.7 or better. Their majors vary from pre-engineering, math, science, business and education to pre-osteopathy, pre-medicine, and nursing. WHO'S NEW? Ron Coan, assistant professor of political science, expects to be awarded his doctorate in public administration and the Soviet Union in December from Miami University, Oxford, Ohio. He received an A.B. degree in history in 1969 from State College at Salem, Mass. (his hometown) and an M.A. from Kent State University in political science in 1971. His wife's name is Debby.

Gelene Adkins, a Brashear native, received a B.S. in nursing from the University in 1975 and spent the past year working towards an M.S. in nursing at the University of Arizona. She's teaching courses in community health and supervising field experience. She's an assistant professor.

Before coming to Northeast, he designed and developed control and forecasting methods to monitor and guide test programs within the Structures Division of the Air Force Flight Dynamics Laboratory and was an instructor in all phases of advanced navigation subjects and management and communication skills to navigator and officer trainees. He holds a B.S.E. degree in electronics from Arizona State University, an M.S. in systems engineering from the Air Force Institute of Technology and an M.B.A. from the University of Dayton. He and his wife have three children.

"OCEANS: OUR CONTINUING FRONTIER" continues to be carried in the Kansas City Star. The National Endowment for the Humanities is sponsoring the course in more than 250 newspapers and educational institutions across the nation. The 16-week series began Sept. 5 and includes lessons on the oceans' impact on art and literature, their importance to international order, their allure as a place to work and play, and the new knowledge of earth's history derived from their study.
