

## Local Doctors' Contribution Boosts Gardner Track Fund Over Goal

A \$30,000 donation from the Northeast Missouri Osteopathic Charitable Trust has allowed Northeast to exceed its expectations for the Gardner Track Fund. Construction is under way on the eight-lane, all-weather-surface track, which is named in honor of the late Northeast track coach and athletic director Kenneth Gardner.

"We truly appreciate the generosity offered by the Osteopathic Trust. Without their support and the contributions of others in the community, completion of this community resource would not have been possible," said Athletic Director Walter Ryle.

In addition to serving the needs of intercollegiate athletics and numerous academic programs at Northeast, the track will provide a safe, attractive setting for recreation, walking, running and jogging for the entire University community and the citizens of



Kirksville.

## Conference To Be Held In Kirksville

The 48th annual meeting of the Midwestern Conference of Parasitologists will be held in Kirksville on June 7 and 8.

The conference will be held on campus and on the Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine campus from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on June 7. On June 8, sessions will be held from 8 a.m. to noon in Science Hall.

Conference speakers will include Sam Stanley Jr. of the Departments of Medicine and Molecular Biology at Washington University, "Developing a Vaccine for Amoebiasis"; Mark James of Tulane University's School of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene, "Immune Aspects of Malaria Infection"; and Philip Wilson of Northeast's Division of Science, "History of Medicine with Special References to Parasites."
