Northeast Featured in *Peterson's Competitive Colleges*

Northeast is among 300 select colleges included in the ninth edition of *Peterson's Competitive Colleges*. This is the fourth consecutive year Northeast has been recognized by the Princeton, New Jersey-based publisher of education and career reference materials.

Competitive Colleges bases inclusion in the guide on the colleges' own admissions data, using information about student achievement rather than applica-

tion numbers or reputation.

The book addresses the growing need for students to consider costs and financial aid as well as quality by presenting a special article that helps students estimate their family's financial contribution with an easy three-step method and gives tips for students with or without financial need. Within each institutional profile, all of the financial data are now contained in one clearly defined section

to make it easy to compare institutions' costs and financial aid arrangements.

This year, Northeast was one of 235 colleges included in the guide joining Peterson's in a special project to send free copies of the book directly to more than 50,000 high-achieving high school students, as well as to high schools that traditionally graduate a high percentage of college-bound minority students.

"Sex Medieval French Style" Discussed

Kenneth Varty, Stevenson Professor of French at the University of Glasgow in Scotland, will present an illustrated lecture titled "Sex Medieval French Style," at 7 p.m., April 25, in Baldwin Auditorium.

Varty's lecture is primarily about the role of women (often victims of adultery and rape) in medieval French society and literature. In particular, he will focus on women's roles in love and marriage. Slides of pictures in medieval manuscripts will be used to illustrate the lecture. The lecture is sponsored by the Division of

Language and Literature and the Beast Fable Society

Varty has held the Stevenson professorship since 1967. He is a former dean of the Faculty of Arts at Glasgow. Varty specializes in medieval and Renaissance French literature, the history of the French language and regional varieties of modern French. He has published six books and more than 70 articles in his field, as well as edited 15 volumes of essays.

Varty has traveled widely on lecture tours in the United Kingdom, France,

Belgium, Holland, Germany, Italy, Israel and the United States. He frequently attends and reads papers at international colloquia, especially those specializing in Arthurian literature and the Beast Fable.

He is vice president of the British Arthurian Society and honorary president of the International Reynard Society, which he founded in 1974. He is also the editorial board's chairman for the Reynard Society's yearbook, *Reinardus*; and contributing editor to *Bestia: Yearbook of the Beast Fable Society*, which is edited and published at Northeast.
