TWO ASPECTS OF SELF is the title of a lecture to be presented by Dr. Fred McKinney, clinical psychologist at the University of Missouri-Columbia, at 3:30 p.m. today in 106 Laughlin Building. The seminar is being sponsored by the Psychology Club and members of the psychology department. All interested persons are invited to attend.

McKinney has served as chairman of the Psychology Department at the University of Missouri-Columbia and as a Fulbright Professor at the University of Ankara in Turkey.
