Crabb Named Professor of the Year

The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching has named R. Paul Crabb, associate professor of music, the 1998 Missouri Professor of the Year.

"I am sincerely honored to receive this teaching award on behalf of my colleagues and the students at Truman, who continually create and provide an atmosphere of inspiration and motivation," Crabb said.

Currently, Crabb is on sabbatical for the academic year. He is studying the German language and researching Mozart at Salzburg College in Salzburg, Austria, the birthplace of Mozart.

Crabb joined the music faculty at Truman in 1991. He holds a bachelor's degree from Bethel College, a master's degree from Wichita State University and a doctorate from Florida State University.

Students recognized Crabb's teaching through his selection as Truman's 1997 Educator of the Year. Hallmarks of his teaching philosophy are enthusiasm, commitment and responsibility. He believes each professor must demonstrate his own deep belief in the subject matter by teaching in a contagiously enthusiastic manner. In addition, professors must show commitment to the discipline, as well as commitment to the education of each student. Finally, a professor must model a responsibility to the discipline and must communicate this to each student. Teachers must then inspire student responsibility to the discipline to ensure true learning. Only when the students realize and acknowledge their active part in the teaching-learning process can they achieve to their potential.

The quality of his choral work has been recognized by his colleagues throughout the state, who extend numerous invitations to

have his select choir, CANTORIA, perform at the prestigious state convention of the Missouri Music Educators Association.

Crabb has appeared as a clinician, conductor and adjudicator in Missouri, Iowa, Kansas, Florida, Alabama and Tennessee. He has organized annual domestic tours for the past 13 years. He has performed with his choirs throughout the United States and in Mexico, Canada, Europe, and Russia. In 1994 and 1995, he was the assistant conductor of the Russian/American Choral Symposium held at the Moscow Conservatory of Music in St. Petersburg, Russia. In 1996, he was invited to be the sole American conductor at this same event.

Despite his busy performing and teaching schedule, Crabb has been involved in research throughout his career. His research on 16th- and 18th-century choral music and performance practice has resulted in publication with three nationally respected music publishing companies. He has also had articles on 18th-century choral music and conducting published in leading refereed journals.

The Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) established the Professor of the Year program in 1981 and works in cooperation with the Carnegie Foundation and various higher education associations in its administration. Truman's Yinfa Ma, associate professor of chemistry, and Dean Van Galen, assistant professor of chemistry and chief advancement officer, were honored as the 1996 and 1991 Missouri Professors of the Year, respectively.

The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, a policy center located in Princeton, N.J., is devoted to strengthening America's schools and colleges. CASE is an international association of colleges, universities and independent elementary and secondary schools.

Symphony Orchestra to Perform

The Truman State University Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of Sam McClure, will perform its first concert of the 1998-99 season 8 p.m., Oct. 13, in Baldwin Auditorium. The concert is free and open to the public.

The program will include Copland's *Rodeo Ballet Suite*, Howard Hanson's *Symphony No. 2* ("Romantic"), and the *Concerto for Cello and Orchestra* by Edouard Lalo, featuring David Shumway as soloist. Both McClure and Shumway are newly appointed faculty members at Truman this year.

The concert features music by two outstanding American composers. The suite from *Rodeo* is taken from the landmark ballet of the same title, choreographed by Agnes DeMille. The score remains one of Copland's most popular and accessible, incorporating the well-known Hoe-Down.

USA Today Seeks Best, Brightest

For the 10th consecutive year, *USA Today* is searching for the best undergraduate students in the nation to be honored on the All-USA College Academic Team.

The 20 students selected for the 1999 First Team will earn a three-day weekend in Washington, D.C., where they will join a public conversation with officials of the nation's universities, tour the nation's only national news museum, gather with representatives of the nine past All-USA Academic First Teams and receive a trophy and a \$2,500 cash award.

The 60 students named to the First, Second and Third Teams will have their achievements described in the Feb. 25,

Howard Hanson's *Symphony No. 2* was commissioned by the Boston Symphony to commemorate its 50th anniversary in 1930. McClure is professor of violin and viola in addition to serving as music director and conductor of the Truman State University Symphony. He also performs as a member of the Truman State Faculty Piano Trio and teaches music theory.

Shumway, assistant professor of music, is an active soloist and chamber musician. He has given recitals in the midwest and in the Baltimore-Washington area.
