PRESIDENT McCLAIN WILL BE THE GUEST ON KIRX's "Area Scene" program at 9 a.m. tomorrow. Among the topics expected to be discussed are the status of the University budget, campus construction, new curricula in animal care and mass communications, and the senior citizens fee waiver program.

WILLIAM UNGER estimates that he's already worked 250 hours on his bicentennial mural on the third floor of the Student Union. Beginning on the east end with scenes depicting the arrival of the Spaniards, the pilgrims, the Christianization of the Indians, into the early days of fur trading, the mural continues on the west end with situations influencing life in the Midwest. In the center is a drawing of Abraham Lincoln reaching out to a Negro. The last scene, taken from Benton's mural "The Farewell," depicts a young man leaving the small community where he grew up to enter life. Unger describes the mural as a "free interpreted composite" of the works of the late Missouri artist Thomas Hart Benton. The mural will be dedicated on July 4, 1976.

THE ONLY ONE AT A STATE UNIVERSITY IN MISSOURI...will be the distinction Northeast will gain with its new program in Animal Care and Health Technology beginning this fall. According to Dennis Rowan of Practical Arts, the program will feature courses "tailor-made" to their students with approximately three or four hours of laboratory work for each hour of lecture. As acting director of the program, Rowan is encouraging prospective students to complete applications immediately as only 20 will be accepted for the first class. Graduates of the 20-month program will be qualified to work as veterinary assistants and in private and public research labs.
