SUMMER COMMENCEMENT PRACTICE will take place at 11:30 a.m. tomorrow in Baldwin Auditorium. All candidates for graduation should attend to receive preliminary instructions. Commencement is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Friday, August 12, in Stokes Stadium.

Speaking at the commencement exercises will be Robert P. Ewing, president of Bankers Life and Casualty Company. He is a native of Kirksville and a NMSU graduate. Ewing received a B.S. in Business Education in 1948.

About 400 students are expected to graduate at commencement. The traditional academic procession will begin at 7 p.m. in Baldwin Hall.

SUMMER GRADUATES may receive their caps and gowns Thursday, August 4, from 1 to 3:30 p.m. or Friday, August 5, from 9 to 11 a.m. on the second floor of the Kirk Building. Students will need to bring their graduation fee receipt.

"ARTS IN THE PARK" tomorrow evening will feature a Watermelon Feast and a Band Festival, a musical program by the University Band, at 7 p.m. in the Quadrangle. The program is free and open to the public. This will be the last of the "Arts in the Park" series for this summer.

GRADUATES are urged to return their Placement Cards to the Placement Office before leaving campus. All graduates seeking employment through the Placement Office will need to inform the office of their current address.

NEWS RELEASES will be distributed to candidates for graduation at Commencement practice. Students desiring news of their graduation to be sent to their hometown news media should fill out the release form. Release forms and photographs, if desired, should be submitted by 4:30 p.m. Friday, August 12, to the Public Relations Office in McKinney Center. Releases will be mailed to hometown news media after graduation ceremonies.

A CARNIVAL for Muscular Dystrophy sponsored by Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority will be held from 1-4 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 6, in Red Barn Park. Carnival highlights include games, sack races, refreshments, and musical chairs.

GRADUATION ANNOUNCEMENTS can be picked up at the Dean of Instruction's Office, Baldwin Hall, from 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Graduates are entitled to ten invitations as a part of their graduation fees. Additional invitations can be bought for 20¢ each or six for \$1. Students must present a graduation fees receipt in order to receive their invitations.

REDECORATION AND RENOVATION continues this summer on Grim and Nason Halls which will be converted to women's residence halls this fall. Dean of Students Terry Smith says the renovation, which consists mainly of painting, is due to an increase in women's housing needs. Student crews are working on the project which will be completed for the beginning of the fall semester.

"YOU CAN'T TAKE IT WITH YOU" by George S. Kaufman and Moss Hart will be playing at the Hannibal Ice House Theatre at 8:15 nightly Tuesday through Sunday. The play was produced during the first season of the Theatre and will be performed again in honor of its 10th anniversary. In this 1930's comedy, the eccentricities of the family and friends who reside in the Vanderhof household make it improbable that the romance between daughter Alice and Tony, a boy from a proper, conventional family, will survive. Also playing is the children's musical, "Two Giants," a fairy tale depicting the adventures of mythical characters and the ultimate triumph of good over evil. Curtain time is 2:00 every Saturday afternoon during the season.
