Sense Of A Woman 1998: Seventh Annual Women's Wellness Symposium

The seventh annual wellness symposium, Sense of a Woman 1998, will be March 21 in the SUB. The symposium is sponsored by the University's Women's Resource Center, Funds Allotment Council, Panhellenic Council, Ryle Hall Senate, Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine, Northeast Regional Health System and Tri-Rivers Planned Parenthood.

This event is free to the public. Exhibits open at 8:30 a.m. in the Activities Room. Local organizations will display information, offer free blood sugar and blood pressure testing, give breast exams and complimentary foot massages.

Beginning at 9 a.m., local professionals will discuss issues of interest to women, including interpersonal violence, parenting, self-esteem, skin care, stress management, exercise, nutrition, osteoporosis and reproductive health care. The Presidential Quartet will also perform.

Health book author and speaker Charlotte Libov is the keynote speaker. She will present "How to Prevent the Top Killers of Women," an informative and entertaining discussion about reducing the risk of developing the major killer diseases of women, including breast cancer, heart disease, diabetes, osteoporosis and stroke. The speech will target an audience ranging in age from 18 to 70.

The Sense of a Woman Wellness Symposium originated with the Women's Resource Center. It began as a small afternoon event and has become a day that provides health information to the Kirksville and University communities.
