## Northeast's 125th: F. Clark Elkins



F. Clark Elkins

The eighth president of Northeast Missouri State College, who served a short term from 1967-1969 was F. Clark Elkins.

Elkins was born in Scranton, Ark. in 1923 and attended high school in Paris, Ark.

He received a bachelor's degree from Arkansas State Teachers College a master's from the University of Ark. a Doctorate of Social Science at Syracuse University and he did some post-doctoral work at the University of Minnesota.

In his inaugural address, Elkins expressed the

need to restore the status of teaching and extended energies in a more effective education system. He emphasized that, "We must commit more of our energies toward helping our various lay publics to see that "the schools of America must save America, as formerly stated by the American Bar Association."

Before assuming the presidency on February 1, 1967 Elkins served as president of Chadron State College in Chadron, Neb. He was also an examiner and consultant of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and chairman of the Visitation and Accreditation Committee for the Western Section of the National Council on Accreditation for Teacher Education.

In Elkins' term, the name of the college changed from Northeast Missouri State Teachers College to Northeast Missouri State College. Also under his term, enrollment continued to rise as did the freshman and overall retention rates.

Elkins resides in Jonesboro, Ark.

## 9th Annual Children's Literature Festival

The Ninth Annual Children's Literature Festival will be held at 9 a.m. April 10 in the SUB. About 1 500 upper elementary and junior high students from area schools are expected to attend.

Seven noted authors will be on campus for the day-long event. They include Bill Brittain, Robert J Burch, Lisa Eisenberg, Vicki Grove, Betsy Haynes, Pamela Service and Doris Buchanan Smith. Shirley Holt, publisher and illustrator, will also be at the Festival. The works by these authors address a wide variety of subjects in varied styles, appealing to a wide range of interests.

Both morning and afternoon sessions will allow the authors and students to meet in small group sessions. The afternoon program will also include a reception at 3 p.m. in the SUB Conference Room. A dinner will be given at 6:30 p.m. in the SUB Alumni Room. The Festival will conclude following an address titled "Looking at the Extraordinary in an Ordinary Life" by Lisa Eisenberg at 7:30 p.m. Eisenberg began her career as a kindergarten teacher before devoting herself to full-time writing.

Dona Truitt, assistant professor of English and director of the Festival, and her committee invite all NMSU faculty and students to participate in the Festival activities.

## Renowned Anthropologist to Visit Northeast

On April 13 Jane Lancaster will visit Northeast as part of the Science Seminar Series. Lancaster is currently chair of the department of anthropology at the University of New Mexico and an internationally recognized expert on primate behavior and its biological relationships to the behavior of humans.

She is an author and editor of several

books, including *Primate Behavior and the Emergence of Human Culture and Parenting Across the Lifespan*, *Biosocial Dimensions*, as well as serving as editor for journals such as *Human Nature: Biosocial Perspectives* and the *American Journal of Primatology*.

Lancaster will discuss her provocative views regarding the evolutionary biological underpinnings of human behavior in two

seminars. A research seminar titled "Male investment in children not their own—who does it and why: a representative sample of men in Albuquerque, New Mexico," will be at 2:30 p.m. in Violette Hall 290. She will present "An evolutionary biologist looks at women," a seminar for a general audience, at 8 p.m. in the SUB Activities Room. The public is welcome at both seminars.

## Chickering to Discuss the "Seven Principles for Good Practice"

Arthur Chickering, well-known researcher and university professor at George Mason University will be at NMSU for an all-day workshop on "Applying the Seven Principles for Good Practice in Undergraduate Education" on April 14 at 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. and 1-3:30 p.m. in the SUB Alumni Room.

The Seven Principles are based on the underlying view of education as active, cooperative and demanding. They distill findings from 50 years of research on the way teachers teach and students learn. The principles assert that good practice: 1) encourages student-faculty contact, 2) encourages cooperation among students, 3) encourages active learning, 4) gives prompt feedback, 5) emphasizes time on task, 6) communicates high expectations and 7) respects diverse talents

and ways of learning.

The Seven Principles was first published in 1987 and two self-assessment inventories based on the principles were developed in 1989.

The "7 Principles" have been receiving attention on the Northeast campus for some time. Chickering will be here to discuss research findings related to the principles, how the principles can be applied in the classroom to improve teaching and learning and how the faculty and institutional inventories can be used to encourage a university environment which is supportive of good practice in college teaching.

The event is being sponsored by the Faculty Development Committee and is open to the public.

will make it possible that McGuire will forever be a living part of the Speech and Hearing Clinic at Northeast. He said the LinguSystems gift will provide students exposure and experience with up-to-date materials and allow them to gain experience with a greater diversity of materials.

"There is probably no better reward for a teacher than to honor him with an event that fosters learning and professional and personal growth, Koutstaal said."

Barrett praised McGuire for inspiring successful clinicians, helping patients conquer

their communication deficits and assisting colleagues and administrators to enrich the curriculum. He also cited McGuire's involvement with humanitarian and civic causes. In summary Barrett said McGuire has enriched the lives of all who have worked, served and learned with him.

The clinic will be housed in the department's present clinician room. The University plans to renovate the room in Violette Hall and officially dedicate the room during 1992 Homecoming activities.

# Spring Break Alternatives

Nationally as many as 3,500 students at more than 100 colleges and universities signed up for alternative spring break programs this year according to Breakaway a national clearinghouse for spring break. Northeast students were among the students who chose to spend their time off from classes to do volunteer work.

One group that spent this break volunteering was four NMSU students who drove more than 25 hours to the Enunciation House in El Paso, Texas. Julie Heger senior Spanish major; Kara Kersten, senior biology major; Mike Smith, junior business administration major; and Susan Torillo, senior political science pre-law major along with Father John Prenger from Mary Immaculate and Sharon Knipp, a physical therapist in Kirksville went to help with the housing of Central Americans who are waiting for their citizenship papers to be processed.

Another group of seven individuals spent a week working with a Mennonite Housing and Rehabilitation organization. Greg Bostrom, senior physics major; Jenny Dickerson, senior English major; Rachel Hulstein, junior English major; Debbie Knaust, junior marketing major; and Trish Turner sophomore communication disorders major travelled with Bob Stephens, director of the Center for Service-Learning, and his wife Cathy to Wichita, Kan. as a part of Habitat for Humanity's Collegiate Challenge.

During their stay in Wichita, the group met and worked with students from the University of the South in Sewanee, Tenn. on the renovation and building of several low-income homes.

The Wichita group was surprised at the

amount of responsibility they were given as a volunteer group. "Especially considering that I was trusted to operate a power saw," Knaust said.

Dickerson said that opportunities like these "really show you what you can do."

"All the work that we did typically hired professionals would do but we did it, and did it well," Turner said.

Three of the students who went to Texas stayed at the Casa de Peregrino in Juarez, Mexico and had a set schedule of things to do. They would get up at 8 a.m., eat and have a prayer group, from 9:30 a.m. to noon, they would sort the donated clothing that was given to the people staying there. From noon to 4 p.m. was free time for the students. When they came back, they helped prepare the meal until it was served

at 7 p.m. Then they would clean up and start the late dinner, serve it and clean up. At 10 p.m., lights were out.

The Texas group went down in a van and while some money for the trip was donated, the students had to pay for their travelling and food expenses. Because the Habitat trip was sponsored by the Center for Service-Learning, transportation for the Wichita group was provided by the University. Each individual made a donation of \$100, part of the money going toward food and lodging, the remainder to support Habitat for Humanity's efforts.

Smith said it was a unique spring break for him. "I accomplished an experience I really did learn something."

He said the trip was a great way to experience the Mexican culture. "I didn't stay in a hotel, I slept on the floor with people who didn't speak any English."

Smith said that although he felt good about what he did, "it seemed hard to make a difference because the problem [between Mexican and Americans] is so big. But, I'd do it again."

Though physically exhausted at the end of the week, the Wichita group enjoyed the experience and would definitely go again.

"The ideal outcome is that students will come to see that community service is a lifetime commitment," said David McDaniels, director of campus chapters for Habitat, which runs the nation's largest alternative spring break program. This year Habitat is sending about 2,800 students to 70 work sites, almost triple the number of students who participated two years ago.

Dickerson said, "Active learning couldn't get any more active than this."
