Northeast Receives \$201,190 Grant

Northeast has received a \$201,190 grant from the United States Department of Education to improve academic advising on campus.

The three-year grant, from the Fund for the Improvement of Post Secondary Education (FIPSE), will support intensive study, planning and evaluation of advising.

"FIPSE is a highly competitive program that supports model projects. Only 60 new grants were made nationwide this year. We are honored to have been chosen to participate and excited about the opportunities this excellent program offers," President Russell G. Warren said.

Dr. Alanna Preussner, of the Division of Language and Literature, is director of the project. According to Preussner, a team of faculty members, staff and stu-

dent researchers will do an intensive study of advising during the first year of the project. First-year funding of \$85,950 will support campus-wide research.

Ten faculty researchers will work with the planning group, student researchers and staff liaison Jennifer DiMuzio, Academic Planning Services. The faculty researchers are Sandra Fleak, associate professor of accounting; John Applegate, associate professor of communication disorders; Patrice Thomsen, instructor of family sciences; Tom Duden, professor of music; Debra Bemben, assistant professor of exercise science; Linda Seidel, associate professor of English; John Bartling, professor of mathematics; Kenneth Hahn, assistant professor of physics; Scott Ellis, associate professor of zoology; and Thomas

Zoumaras, assistant professor of history.

The second and third years of the project will focus on specific plans to improve advising, including a campus-wide conference, workshops within academic divisions and choice of master advisers. FIPSE will support 100 percent of budgeted costs.

Dean of Instruction Jack Magruder said, "The FIPSE project responds directly to faculty and student concerns. We want to make academic advising the centerpiece of the University's liberal arts and sciences mission."

"FIPSE was impressed by the fact that our project will cover the entire campus community—students and faculty, professional and para-professional advisers," Preussner said.

Dr. Paul Parker will discuss the "shift by the (Supreme) Court in 1937 toward a greater protection of rights of individuals" and will look at more recent court rulings in order to "speculate" upon these questions: "Did the revolution of 1937 generate a counterrevolution of the 1980s? Can we truly understand either of these apparent shifts by the court as revolutionary, or is this simply the result of shifting political fortunes? The answer to these questions might provide suggestive answers to whether we can expect a counter-counterrevolution of the 2010s." This lecture is a part of the Liberal Arts and Sciences Lecture Series that will focus on revolution this year.
